### What is the Patriotic Fund?

A fund for collecting, administering and distributing in case of need, assistance to wives, children or dependents of soldiers on active service. No married men have as yet gone from Durham, but Warden Calder says more money comes to the country from the Fund than from the wages and children of soldiers than goes from the County.

No portion of any money so far raised in Durham has gone to assist the Patriotic Fund. The contributions to this fund from other places amount in the aggregate to about \$4,000,000. It is being reduced at the rate of about \$3,000,000 month and is now reduced below two and a half millions. The calls upon it grow daily and will become greater.

### Church Union Not Favoured in Durham

The vote in progress for the last month in Durham Presbyterian Church was completed on Sunday last and results tabulated on Monday evening. About 150 votes were not polled and of these at least 100 were available. The figures are:

In February, 1912, there were three questions: (1) For or against Union; (2) For or against the basis; (3) Asked for suggestions or proposed alterations. The figures three years ago were as follows:

Looking the Union figures for 1912 showed a majority For of 97, 1915 a majority Against of 29, a difference of 126!

Another way of looking at it: Voting Union 1912 — 73 per cent

1915 — 45 per cent

C. C. JAMES  
As we go to press we learn that C. C. James, of Fenwick's foremost citizens, died Wednesday at 5 p. m. The funeral takes place Friday.

**PETER O'NEIL**  
Early Tuesday morning another of the pioneers of Glenelg township passed away at the patriarchal age of 90 years. His death may be said to be due to old age, though paralysis hastened the end.

Peter O'Neil was born in Co. Wexford, Ireland, and came to Canada about the age of 18, shortly after finding his way to Glenelg township, now 50 years ago, and has been there ever since, one of the most well-known and respected men in the community. He married shortly after settling here and a family grew up around them and all were privileged to be with him to the end. The daughters are Mrs. Jas. Lenahan and Mrs. Carter, Owen Sound, Mrs. Jas. Layelle, Stratford, and Mrs. Alfred and John are at home, and Michael in De Lisle, Sask. Those with his partner in life will long keep his memory green. The funeral takes place to-day at St. John's cemetery.

**Her Life a Sermon—  
Her Memory a Benediction.**

**MRS. DANIEL KNECHTEL**  
Under the above heading last week's Hanover Post pays fitting tribute to the life and death of Mrs. Daniel Knechtel. She died on the 18th Nov. in her 70th year, from an attack of paralysis, after a happy married life of almost 60 years. Like her well-known husband she was public spirited and the Baptist church especially will miss her activities. The heading above was the motto on the funeral tribune presented by her six pall-bearers, who in early days of her husband's business, enjoyed home comforts and motherly care in the Knechtel home. They were Mayor Wm. H. Pepler, Christian Hill, Henry Glasser, S. William Edward Spelman, all now well known and prominent in the community. Her husband and two sons survive her, the Post says was one of Hanover's first citizens in point of time and in kindly disposition and held five places in the affections of all who knew her. A business was suspended on the afternoon of her interment.
