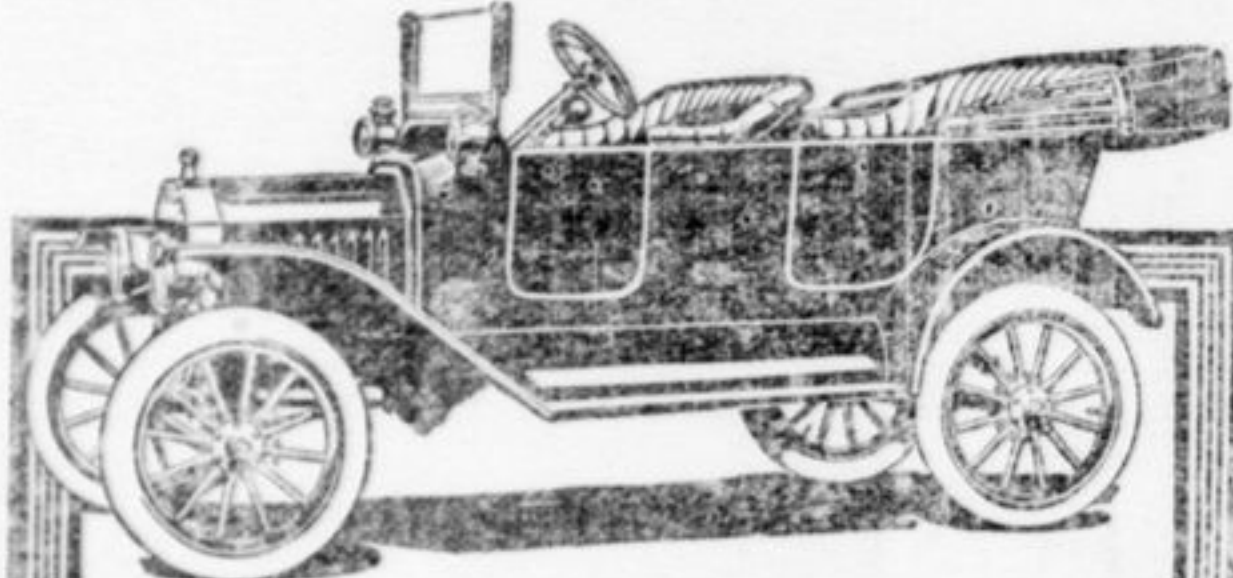

Senator Sproule

Many kind things are being said these days of Hon. Thos. S. Sproule, late speaker of the House of Commons, who has been appointed to the Senate. The selection seems a wise one as long as a Senate is retained, such men as he will be worthy members. He was first elected for E. Grey in 1878, always victorious in every contest since and only once, says the Markdale Standard had an opponent of his own party pitted against him in Convention. The Standard last week further says:

He has seen the personnel of Cabinets and the Composition of the House pass through many changes during his day. He has served under 7 Premiers, viz: Sir John A. McDonald, Sir J. J. C. Abbott, Sir John Thompson, Sir McKenzie Bowell, Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir R. L. Borden. During his term as Speaker of the House, which extended over four years, though it was not for some exciting sessions, he realizes that he is leaving the House with the good will of all, and that his conduct of the duties as Speaker has given general satisfaction and as far as his other duties as head of the House, the numerous letters that he has already received from officials and employees of the House, expressing their regret of his severing his connection with them and their appreciation of his impartial and competent executive management of the duties of his office go to show their good will and appreciation.

The Doctor has been a resident of Markdale for half a century, and with his estimable wife is held in high respect and esteem, and both neighbors and constituents all over the riding, extend hearty congratulations in his merited elevation to the Senate.

Latest Phases of the Temperance Movement

Conservative Comment

The Hamilton Spectator (Con.): "The popular approval of special regulations to keep the saloons under training out of temptation, has led many a citizen who heretofore has not given much attention to the temperance question, to wonder whether the Province is not ripe for a change as radical as that which has superseded in Russia. Certainly the vote that would be cast in favor of prohibition outright would be larger in Ontario to-day than ever before."

The Peterborough Review (Con.): "The present campaign for prohibition hardly admits of a reasonable doubt. Ontario just now seems to show an inclination to follow the West. When the people of Ontario, by a plebiscite vote, declare for prohibition, there is nothing left for any Legislature that may be in power at the time to do but to give the mandate attention with all legal expedition."

Local Option

Over two hundred licenses in the Province are being assailed in the present Local Option campaign. What makes the contest this winter even more spectacular than generally is the unusually large number of cities which are to vote on the question. There are eight of these: Belleville, Brantford, Fort William, Niagara Falls, Port Arthur, Sarnia, Stratford and Woodstock, with a total of one hundred and fifteen licenses.

Committed of One Hundred Already the Committee of One Hundred, the strictly non-partisan organization whose motto is "Ontario Dry by First of July," has at least two big accomplishments to its credit—first, the bringing of Billy Sunday to Toronto, who, caused more shake-up and commotion than any event in Ontario for some time, and secondly, the appointment, as its general organizer of Mr. George A. Warburton, the General Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in Toronto, and one of the best known organizers of philanthropic and patriotic movements in the country.

With such a stimulus and under such leadership the movement is bound to be vigorous and effective.

Reduced Postage on Parcels to Soldiers at the Front

Post Office Department,
Ottawa, Canada

The Honourable T. Chase Casgrain, Postmaster General of Canada, has been successful, as a result of negotiations entered into with the Imperial Postal Authorities, in effecting an arrangement with the British Government whereby parcels from Canada for Canadian soldiers in France and Flanders will be carried at the same rate of postage as applies to parcels from the United Kingdom for the Expeditionary Forces on the Continent, that is:

For parcels weighing up to three pounds 24c
For parcels weighing over three pounds and not more than seven pounds 32c
For parcels weighing over seven pounds and not more than eleven pounds 38c

This means a material reduction on the cost of parcels, and it is hoped it will be a source of satisfaction to the Canadian public. This reduction has been brought about by Canada foregoing all postal charges for the conveyance of these parcels in Canada and on the Atlantic.

The public are reminded, however, in accordance with the circular issued by the Department recently, that until further notice, no parcel can be sent weighing over seven pounds.

The Soaring Egg Market

For the first time in many years eggs are prominent in Canada's export trade. This is due to the unprecedented demand of British dealers for Canadian rather than United States eggs. Canadian dealers have shipped all the storage product and at present supplies for home consumption are scarce.

As a result of these conditions, eggs are being brought into Canada from the States and these can be laid down here, duty paid, at less than what Canadian eggs are selling for. Producers in Canada may rest assured that for some time, high prices will prevail for fresh gathered eggs that will grade "Specials." If the quality of eggs going forward to Britain keeps up there is a likelihood of a great development of the poultry business and of Canada as an egg producing country. Meanwhile the consumer will have to look to the U. States for the cheaper article.

"Has the Esteem of Manly Men."

The Montreal Star, (Conservative) commenting on Sir Wilfrid Laurier's determination to shun party controversy during the war as evidenced by his opposition to a contest in Hochelaga, when the Nationalist, Patenaude, was made Minister of Inland Revenue, has the following to say:

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier is to be warmly commended by Canadians of all parties—who realize that the first business of every British community to-day is to fight and win this war for the decisive fashion in which he prevented a breach of the political truce in Hochelaga. Sir Wilfrid pledged himself to such a truce when the first German gun was fired, and most loyally he kept that pledge. He is with those who believe that there should be no civil decision—no party election—in this country until the war is over, and with him stand, we are confident, all the better and more patriotic elements in the community."

He has resisted a considerable temptation in vetoing a contest at this time in Hochelaga, when it is felt by many that the ill-smelling war purchase scandals might have offered him an off-putting issue. But he believes, apparently—and we think correctly that the time is not yet for a discussion of these vital and far-reaching questions before the election. Undoubtedly, it is the duty of Parliament as at present constituted to discuss them, for this Parliament must stand until the war is finished as the trustees of the nation. The whole country has been shamed by the revelations before the Davidson Commission, and, in wartime, punishment for such offences should be even swifter than in the less critical periods of peace. But this is a far different matter from seeking to strengthen a political party in Parliament by contesting an open constituency.

In taking this stand, Sir Wilfrid will have the support not only of the sane sections of his own party—but of the less partisan portions of the Conservative party as well. He may not get his just meed of praise from sycophants who ever worship the sun sun—from self-seekers who fawn upon the powers that be—but he will receive his reward in the esteem of all manly men whom neither partyism nor "patronage" can blind, and from the calm verdict of history which will immortalize the statesman who stands most steadily by the State in this, her supreme hour of trial.
