The Boys are O ft

To Don His Majesty's Uniform

Durham and his wife and family, grey beards and kiddies, hurried through with their dinner on Wednesday, for were not the newly-enlisted boys to entrain at 11 a. m. for Owen Sound to don His Majesty's uniform and go into training to take their place in defence of the empire.

A procession from the Town Hall added to the congested crowd already on the platform, a crowd which grew beyond all bounds and overflowed in every direction. It was impossible to move through it and when the train came in it was only by pushing and squeezing the boys got aboard, accompanied by some friends.

The train pulled out its own length, the crowd spread towards the train track and again an address was read by Mayor Hunter, breathing appreciation of the boys and wishing them success. Col. McFarlane, W. Calder and W. Laidlaw made addresses to the small portion of the crowd within hearing, and after more handshakes and cheering, waving good-byes, the train sped on to receive similar, if smaller additions on the way to Owen Sound, via Dundalk.

It was the biggest demonstration of its kind ever seen in Durham. The school, business places and furniture factory closed for a couple of hours, and only here and there, away back in the brain, was there a realization of the grim and bloody work that possibly may lie before our boys. May Providence guide them in their goings and may the boys strive to honor their old home town.

Messrs H. B. Miller and R. J. Ball, M. P. accompanied the Hanover contingent and from Durham there went Messrs W. Laidlaw, A. A. Catton and others.

Owen Sound "Dry" by over 400

Under the above heading the Star gives the results in detail of Local Option voting. We give a summary of the progress made in spite of and hindered by the 3-5ths clause.

47 places voted, involving 209 licenses. 18 places, including 5 cities, gave majorities in favor but not 3-5ths. Six places only were defeated by majorities. 20 places won against the handicap and over 50 licenses will be abolished.

Ottawa gave a majority of 2000 for license reduction and bars will be cut down from 75 to 38. Repeat contests were tried in Finch and North Gower and both defeated.

The most spectacular of all the contests was that of Owen Sound. As in former contests a "dead set" was made by the traffic to win Owen Sound. They had won a technical victory when they secured a mandamus compelling council to submit the by-law, yet they have gone down to defeat by the largest majority ever piled up against them, one account says 478.

This ought to settle the question in our county town for more than three years. We congratulate it on the result.
