The Retreat to Salonika

Graphic Description of Conditions by Cecil Wolfe.

The following letter from our townsmen to his parents here shows marked contrast to his experiences in Egypt. We have read few more graphic touches of war experience and we hope Cecil will live to tell his townsmen in person the trials of that retirement that has burned into his brain.

I suppose you have been waiting anxiously for a letter from me since you received my last letter, which I believe I wrote on Dec. 2nd, as it was written from Hansanti, in Serbia, which is now in the hands of the Bulgarians. I have had no chance or means of writing a letter since as it would have no way to reach the base, and we have been continually on the move, until now or rather last night when we arrived in Salonika and very glad we were to get here. I will try to give you as good an account of what happened as I possibly can which you will understand better if I draw you a rude map on the next page.

I wrote my last letter from Hansanti which you will see marked on my rude map and at the time I wrote it our guns and men were entrenched where I have marked the English line. The Bulgarians attacked between Tartal and Dedelit which are two villages and captured right of our field guns, forcing us to fall back through the gorge in the mountains to Causti, where we entrenched and erected new machine guns. This gorge runs between two mountains and has a road out through it out of the solid rock with a drop of about 200 ft. The road there is only wide enough for two limbers to pass at once and in the confusion of the retreat, men and horses and wagons were pushed over the ledge down the awful drop.

We had this road already mined so that after the last were over it was blown up but to no avail as the Bulgarians found a road over the mountain.
