### "The Greatest of These is Charity."

The following thoughtful and sympathetic paper from the pen of Mrs. Wm. Sackett, Priceville, appeared elsewhere and received high commendation from Principal A. P. McKisnie of the "Arts and Letters School", Toronto, and others. In this time of stress, when the seeds of accused German militarism are bearing such horrid fruit, we are better of being reminded that many German hearts amongst us are poignantly affected thereby, and that to them blame should not be attached. We do well to remember Mrs. Sackett's heading "The Greatest of These is Charity."—[Ed.]

I noticed some time ago in one of the local papers a list of recruits and among the names I saw some from a little town when I knew and I knew the boys to be what we call our German-Canadians, some of them whose parents and some more whose grandparents were born in the old Fatherland. The Sons of Canada are Canadians and as such must needs fight for battles for her and that is as it should be. But—have we ever thought of the parents of these boys and if we have, have our thoughts been charitable ones? I do not possess one drop of German blood in my whole make-up, nor have I one relative or connection that I know of, who has, but I lived among these people for a time, I knew their sterling qualities and their generous hearts and my heart ached for them and I sympathized with them. I do not mean when I saw the names of their sons going to fight against the old Fatherland, I do not believe that there is one out of every hundred who would wish for German rule in Canada, but the fact of birth are strong with them as with our own nationalities.

I was talking one day to a fine old money-headed patriot of the hasty-bred kind of Old Scotia and thinking to get his opinion, began drawing him out on the subject of the war and said "Well but," I said, "is it not the German's fault, is their leader who are to blame," I said "don't you remember what that returned officer who was wounded at the Somme," told us how on Xmas day he and his suspended and the German soldiers in the front trenches, how a flag of truce and the British soldiers went over to the German trenches and were treated by the Germans to the best they had to eat and drink. Then in return the German soldiers came back to the British trenches and were treated in the same manner and before separating in the night, both sang together but in their own languages a Christmas Carol of Peace on Earth Good Will to Men. And the pity of it all was that the next day they were taking one another's lives because

"I said "Our German-Canadians are all right." "Oh but," he said "they're not loyal, they don't want the boys to fight for Canada." "No, that's not it," I replied, drawing him out a little more. "Of course," I said, "now if it were Canada and Scotland that were fighting you would want your boys to fight for Canada wouldn't you?" I think I can see his bent form straightening up and his face old head thrown back and his blue eyes fire burned in his eyes as he said with emotion "What fight against Scotland—never!"

"Oh but," I said "they're Canadians, aren't they?" "Without any hesitation," he replied "they are and they're proud of it." Well I suggested that they would want to fight for Canada. His head dropped dejectedly and when he spoke it was at all most a groan, as he said "I pray to God such a thing will never happen. I assured him that it was not likely to."

"No!" he replied with vehemence, "but if such a thing did come, I know what I would do." He spoke the words proudly, though sorrowfully—"they would fight for their country against mine and it would break my old heart."

Later, as I mused upon his words, I thought of a little story that I had read somewhere, how when Pat first came to this country. Being out walking one morning with a companion, on meeting him by chance he scooped him with "hello Pat and how do you like this country?"

"Oh," answered Pat, "it's not so bad." But immediately breaking into a torrent of glowing epigrams as to the beauty and goodness of the Emerald Isle as compared with this country, left Canada far in the shade. The acquaintance passing on, Pat's friend said to him "see here Pat, you'll have to be loyal to the country that's giving you your bread and butter." Pat was deeply impressed, not having at that time, then thoughtfully for some time, then seemingly to have settled the question to his own satisfaction, raising his head jauntily and gazing up into the clouds, where in his mind's eye appeared the blue lakes and the valleys green, he addressed the vision, he exclaimed "Oh! Ireland, acushla, you're the best of them."
