It is natural for our Canadian German nationality to feel for their country. If English, Irish or Highland Scotch had the leaders of their country in the old land the means of causing war with other countries, which might be their homes, they would certainly feel ashamed to own their old country leaders, on account of being the means of causing war against innocent people of other countries and would feel like going to fight, as the case might be, some close relatives. Sometimes we come in contact with German families and they treat us kindly. They feel ashamed to talk of their old country leaders on account of being the means of causing the present war.

We heard a good Highlander telling a story not long ago of another Highlander, who was telling him of his mistake while coming home from Kelly's mill, Dutham, probably 50 years ago. In coming to old Callie Dunn's, as she was called, she had a rousing fire on and as the natives were cold, they enjoyed a good warming and a good dram of old Rye, as it was only two pennies a glass. So they all felt good and warm, while the poor oxen were standing in the cold shed covered with hemlock brush, so they all thought it time to go home, but this good booz forgot to take his oxen till he was near his home in the vicinity of Priceville and had to walk back and found the oxen standing where he left them.

This reminds us of another story. We heard an old Scotch lady telling of a father and mother who went to the minister to get their first child baptized in one of the Isles of Scotland. Both father and mother fixed themselves with the best they had so as to appear decent before the minister asked them to bring the child to get baptized, but the father said to his young wife "on a bhean diuinach a m'as a padain thoir lein" or "oh my wife, we forgot to bring the child with us." This shows the absent-mindedness of some people. We all heard of the professor who held his
