Interesting Description of Conditions in the Mediterranean by Lieut. Coutts—scenes at Lemnos form subject of a cleverly written letter.

(Rev. Dr. Farquharson kindly sends the following letter from his brother-in-law, Dr. Coutts, which is one of the best of its kind that has come our way. His style is vivid and picturesque.—Ed.)

At last we are off, sweeping out to sea—a thrilling sensation. For six months we have been immersed in the old Lemnos—barren, arid, spiridless, dead. I never realized the fact as I do now, restored to liberty and a new life. Every day had its duty and its allied interest. The time hung heavily on my mind. It was simply a probationary spell whose end I knew would come, and did not concern myself particularly looking for it. But now it has come and the freshness and luxury and lightness of the change are very gratifying. The dust storms and the grind and dirt of tent life, the poor food and the illness and privation have, I now realize, played upon my mind and it is refreshing in the atmosphere of a new venture.

During the past weeks we have been waiting, expecting to hear the orders to go. Our patients are nearly all gone and now we are packed with equipment. The Council met April 1st, pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: From Children's Aid Society for aid, McLean reports, F. J. Haggan Hydro Electric, Exeter Manufacturing Company Price List, Municipal World account, Geo Campbell report as Treasurer, Ontario Dep. of Agriculture to have a director appointed, Bond Corporation Circular, R. J. Torry asking for assistance, Margaret McColl asking to be relieved from taxes for 1916 on account of A. A. Ivan and S. E. Edwards and T. A. Lauder, expressing gratitude for favors granted them as recruits. From the Clerk, list of recruits from Glenelg.

Accounts were paid as follows: 35 recruits at \$8.00 each, \$280.00; the Clerk on salary \$50.00; the Assessor on salary \$20.00; Municipal World account, \$8.85; the Reeve, \$3.60 on Sanitary work; Mal. McInnes, \$1.00 on Sanitary work; Lenahan & McKechnie, 40c. paid for Hall; Children's Aid Society, \$5.00 grant; Margaret McColl, to be relieved from T. p. taxes, Daniel Edge was appointed to represent Glenelg on the Ontario Board of Agriculture. Mr. McLean refunded \$1.50 unexpended gravel money. \$250.00 was appropriated for each ward to improve roads.

Turnbull—McInnes—That this Council, while regretting the cause and necessity of so many of our young men having to leave the farms of Glenelg, desires to put on record our sincere appreciation of the spirit of patriotism made manifest by the number who are so willing to put their own lives in danger for the protection of their homes and liberties and that the Clerk be instructed to devote a page of the Minute Book for the registering of their names, pending the time when recruiting in Glenelg is exhausted, when such other means may be adopted to commemorate their sacrifice as the Council may see fit.—Carried.
