when potatoes are needed is a public benefactor.

According to present production and consumption in Ontario from twenty-five to thirty people or from five to six families are supplied with potatoes for one year from each average acre of land which the farmer plants with this crop. An increase of fifty per cent in yield would mean an increase in the amount of potatoes produced on each average acre of land sufficient to supply about one dozen people for twelve months.
