To an Owen Sounder at camp on Saturday, Col. McFarland expressed himself as highly delighted and gratified at receiving such high praise from Col. Bickford. It will be a stimulus for both officers and men to keep up their record.

### The Late Neil D. McKenzie.

Mr Neil D. McKenzie, one of Egremont's earliest settlers, passed away at his residence here on Saturday last after a short illness. Deceased had reached the good old age of 88 years and 4 months. He was born in Arran, Scotland, in the year 1828 and when about a year old came to this country with his parents and settled in the province of Quebec about 60 years ago he came to the township of Egremont. He first taught school for 3 years in a small schoolhouse, which was situated where Misses Sarah and Maria Brown's residence is now. Then he engaged in the store-keeping business, being the first merchant and postmaster in Holstein. He was 12 years in business when he retired in 1875 and built the brick residence on the hill, which he occupied up to his death.

In the year 1859 he married Jane Main, daughter of the late Jno. Main, who predeceased him 20 years ago. To mourn his loss he leaves one daughter Jane, Mrs J. D. Roberts and two sons, Dr. Dougall of Newmarket and Dr. Jno. of Newmarket. One daughter, Mrs D. Wallace, died 21 years ago. In religion he was a staunch Presbyterian, being an elder for many years. He presided the Holstein Presbyterian church with the property on which the church is built. In politics he was a Reformer and always took a deep interest in all the affairs of the township, being Dep. Reeve and Councillor and holding other important offices.

The funeral which was held from his residence on Monday afternoon to Mt. Forest cemetery, was largely attended. The pall bearers were the elders of the Presbyterian church, Mr R. Christie, Mr Jas. Ellis, Mr J. Philp, Mr A. Hunter, Mr D. Greer and Mr W. H. Rogers. Among those who attended the funeral from a distance were Mr A. McKillop of Harriston, Miss Rachel Ferguson and Mr Neil McMillan of Swinton Park, Mrs Duff Morrison of Mt. Forest and Dr. D. McKenzie of Newtonville.

### Quit your Grumbling

\$11 to \$1.50 a hundred, live weight, for hogs recalls the time, when in Upper Canada, the price of dressed hogs went as low as \$2, or 10 shillings currency, as it then was, per hundred. This was in 1888, the winter of the McKenzie rebellion. The same winter the farmer who told the writer of that experience drew out fifteen miles to Galt, and sold them for "a York shilling"—twelve and a half cents—a bushel—both pork and oats being payable in store goods, at more on the average than double present prices. A very poor quality of red flannel sold at a dollar a yard, and a very inferior quality of tea brought the same price a pound. As a favour, the farmer was allowed enough to pay his toll on the way home. Do any of us de well to grumble at present day conditions?—Orillia Packet.

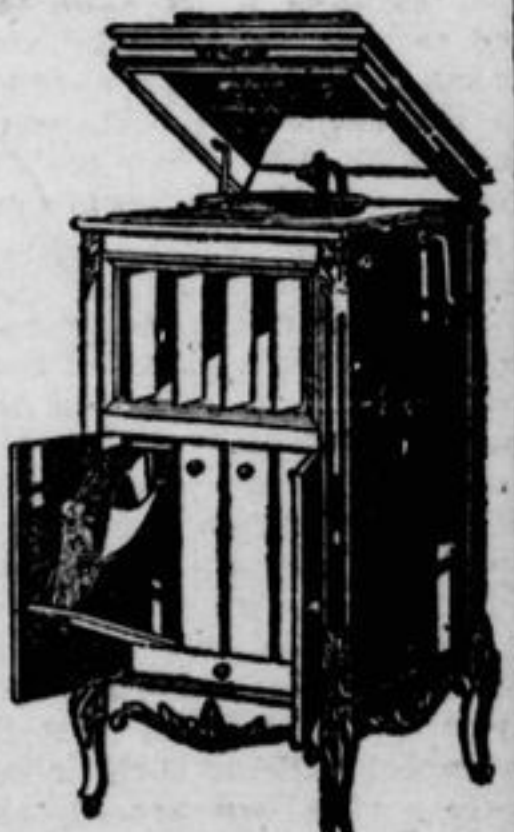
