Mr. and Mrs. S. Kinell, Dundalk, also Mrs. Wm. Dezell, were visitors over Sunday at Mr. John Dezell's.

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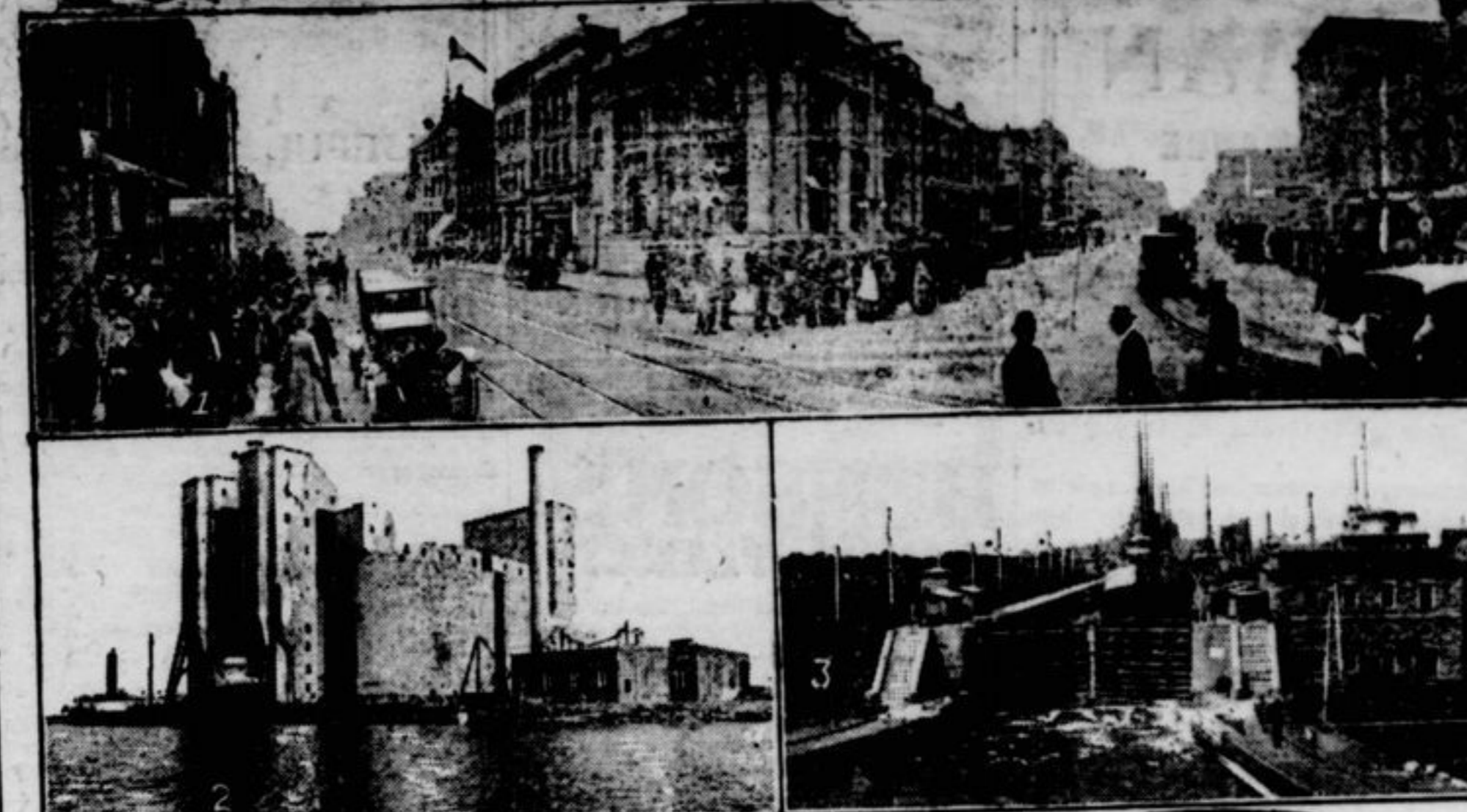

The Soldiers' Graves

That interesting paper, 'The Listening Post' published at the British front under the auspices of the 7th Canadian Battalion, has an item in a recent number that will probably be of interest to numbers of our readers, and specially to those whose relatives have fallen.

The item is as follows: "Those at the front probably know of the good work being done by the Graves Registration Commission in recording the location of the graves of our fallen comrades. The chaplain must report to them every burial he conducts, with the location of the grave. But now the Commission is prepared to do more. They will furnish to the wife, mother, or other near relative of a deceased man a photograph of his grave. Relatives must make application to the chaplain of the unit to which the deceased was attached, giving his name, rank, number, etc., and the date of his death.

T. B. Scott Found Murdered

We were shocked last week to receive clippings from Port Arthur papers telling of the murder of T. B. Scott, whose mother and other relatives live on the town line, South of Genie. One account says: "He was found dead near his shack in Blake township, sixteen miles from the city, his head and arms full of gaping bullet wounds. The authorities are convinced that the man was murdered, but so far have been unable to discover a clue or a motive for the crime. There were three wounds in all on the body. One bullet entered the left forearm and coming out on the other arm, passed through the abdomen, coming out on the right side. The other two were on his head. One went in the left side of his head and came out the right side of the jaw, while the other evidently entered the left side of the head and came out on the right side above the ear. The wound on the forehead was evidently the result of his throwing his arm in the air to ward off the first shot from his assailant's revolver or gun.

Residents of the valley speak highly of the dead man. He always lived alone in a sort of hermit style. He had no enemies and was known as a quiet genial man. No gun or other firearm was found beside the body. A team of horses, harnessed, were found in the stable.

No one seems to be able to throw any light on the crime. Scott was always on the best of terms with the neighborhood. An effort is now under way to locate the murderer or murderers. Provincial Game-warden Symons has left the city this morning for the scene of the crime. A jury has been summoned and this morning a post mortem was held on the body which is lying in Henderson's morgue, the jury adjourning until next Monday night at 7:30 o'clock to take evidence. In the meantime, the provincial police can be depended upon to do this crime to speedy justice.

Robbery as a motive for the crime is not credited. In the pockets of the dead man's clothes when he was found was change amounting to something over \$1, and the opinion is expressed by residents of the valley who knew him that he did not keep money in his house. His mother who resides near Priceville, Ontario, has been notified of his death.

The above are the facts as far as we know at present. His nephew Frank Scott went up to attend to interment and adjust his estate. We sincerely sympathize with the relatives in their affliction. Interment took place on the 18th inst.
