The tone of Prince von Buelow's new book on "German Policies"—according to the cabled excerpts—is disquieting to those who had dreamed of another kind of peace when the great conflict will have ceased.

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But when all this is done, the fact still stands out that after twenty-three months of the worst war in history the responsible leaders of Europe are no nearer the readjustments which might make for a continued peace than they were on that day in August, 1914, when the impossible became possible as destruction unredeemed of was begun.

The appointment of David Lloyd-George as secretary for war to succeed the late Lord Kitchener again emphasizes the fact that Great Britain realizes it has found the exceptional man whom great crises often produce to deal with tremendous national problems.

It also emphasizes the fact that these exceptional men whom nations somehow find to serve them in their hour of need cannot be bred to order from any class or caste. They often come from the most unsuspected quarters.

Had anyone predicted at the beginning of the war the large part that the little Welshman would play he would have been regarded as insane. Were anyone to deny it now he would be thought even more insane.

It is the glory and greatness of democracy that it provides the widest possible field for training and selection of the exceptional man who is to serve in the time of extreme need.
