

Clearly, spraying is the only method by which we may expect to be able to destroy these worms, and from the fact that they feed extensively upon the foliage, it would appear to be easy to

get satisfactory results. Professor Slingerland of Cornell university has pointed out that in the experience of some of his correspondents it is very difficult to kill this green fruit worm after the apples are large enough to furnish food. It is probable that an early spraying would be effective, and we recommend that four Commencing Sunday, June 25th, pounds of arsenate of lead be added to will be inaugurated a fast and frequent every fifty gallons of lime-sulphur or Kawartha Lakes train service between Torouto and the tobacco extract applied just before Camp Borden via Canadian Pacific, as the fruit buds open, or in water at the same time or a little earlier if there is no other pest requiring treatment.

Not Good For Peach Trees.

Stable manure alone is not the best plant food for a thrifty peach orchard. The manure contains too large a proportion of nitrogen. The effect of this is to drive the trees to wood growth rather than to fruit.
