**An Extraordinary Election**

South-West Toronto Elects Hartley Dewar, a Liberal!

These are hard times for the Conservative government of Ontario, when, by a vote of 77 to 67, at the last election gave 77% of a Conservative majority, now reverses its vote and gives a Liberal majority of 67.

And this in spite of the Conservative candidate's endorsement by Premier Hearst, in spite of strenuous and nightly efforts of three members of the cabinet, Hon's Lucas, Ferguson and McTavish, and six or seven Legislative members. No one seems to blame Norris: the government is not satisfying the people.

It will be said that the liquor men are punishing Hearst for his temperance legislation. In the light of the bye-elections in Peel, North York and elsewhere this can not be maintained. The cause lies deeper: and Mr Dewar seems to have touched the spot when he made the Hydro, electric and nickel questions the issues in his campaign. Another cause, as Conservative canvassers found, was that though not connected with Provincial politics, Camp Borden and the Hughes-Allison mix-up has got on the imagination of the people, and innocent men may suffer.

The people have lost confidence in the government, and an election now would assuredly put Kowell in power.

The Globe says: "The defeat of the Government candidate in southwest Toronto yesterday—no matter who was elected and no matter what else the election may mean—is a rebuke to the Government itself, a rebuke which in the circumstances means utter and humiliating defeat."

It was the Government's fight. The ground was Government fighting ground. The Government forces were in full possession, with all the resources of campaign machinery and party funds at their command. The issues were those upon which the Government had made loud and challenging boasts—Niagara, Hydro, Temperance. The Government's opponents were divided into three mutually antagonistic camps—Liberal, Independent Liberal Socialist. All the available members of the Government were on the platform and in the campaign they exhausted their full stock of munitions.

And yet, in spite of it all, the Government was defeated and defeated with such abruptness and weight of emphasis that no shadow of doubt remains as to the significance of that defeat. Southwest Toronto, a Tory stronghold of the Government's own making, not only has not enough respect for the Premier, to pay it the poor compliment of a decent vote, but the vote it did register is directly and avowedly a repudiation of the candidate chosen by the party, accepted by the Premier and endorsed, publicly and authoritatively endorsed, by the whole Cabinet.

And it was for this candidate and to secure his election, Premier Hearst "wobbled" from his high stand on the Temperance question! For this candidate too, the Attorney-General, from his campaign platform, called for "a majority of 3,000, 4,000 or 5,000," and promised to put his "ear to the ground."
