A private letter from Corp. G. C. Ramsay who has been in Scotland, tells of meeting Alex Bell in Edinburgh. He is here to commence his 2nd six days leave since coming to England. The day he came was my last day of the forenoon with me. I wish he could have come a week sooner and we would have toured together, but when I went I had lots of company. HANDS OFF THE MEAT.—The writer was in a local meat shop the other day, and while waiting his turn to be served, noticed the large number of customers that handle the meat before purchasing. This is contrary to the Board of Health regulations, a great many of the butchers having signs up to that effect, but signs of this kind seem to be ignored by most purchasers. Many people are particular about buying meat which they think has been handled by customers, but in a great many cases are the chief offenders. A local butcher informed us the other day that he has taken to task many of his customers for this offence, and several became indignant. The handling of meat is not only against the law; it depreciates its value from a selling standpoint.—E.K.

Some strange admissions on the care of the baby have been gleaned by a visiting nurse from a number of essays by school children in a country town. Sound advice is mixed with bizarre reasoning. Quotations from the essays follow:

"Don't let the baby suck its thumb, for there might be a fly on it and it would get the disease of the fly." "Don't rock the baby, as it will toss its brains."

"If a baby gets beer every day, it won't grow very large and it won't be good in school." "Rocking is not good for it; it makes them sick and stiff."

"Bad habits are easily made by the mothers and the babies get wise to it." "If you give the baby alcohol, he will lose one-half pound every year and will become drunk when he is old."

"Never lift it up by the arms, because it will place them out of place. Never, never, never pick up the baby by the arms whatever."

"The public owes the baby as follows: Pure air and sunshine; pure, cool, fresh, free-flowing air at night; its own private bed, sufficient covering of fluffy, porous materials and the chance to be a perfect man or woman."

Agreement Agricultural Society's Annual Show in Holstein on Wednesday

while behind the best years, was still better than an average. A gate of about 5200 was very good. The day was a little unpromising, but the threatened rain held off until 4 p. m., and dampened the close literally and figuratively. Over 90 animals in cattle classes shows no lessening of interest. We witnessed the judging of 7 or 8 excellent Hereford cows and did not envy the judge. 44 of the woolly tribe and almost 500 ewes, also furnished keen competition. The poultry exhibit was, we think, the largest in years.

The hall looks scrupulously large from the effects of the dry summer. Roots, vegetables and fruit, being on the whole below the average. Ladies' culinary work shows no diminution, except perhaps in the butter classes. As usual a great display of bread and all looked excellent.

Needle and finger work upstairs "beat the Dutch," some called it. The largest exhibit ever made. Ladies' lavished loving lingering looks on some of the articles that the mere man passed by.

The floral display was much behind this year and grain a trifle scanty. A few of the fine arts exhibits showed real taste. Good writing exhibits, but the writers have yet to learn about indentation of lines in poetry.

A bagpipe band from Hopeville district, furnished stirring music but the rain spoiled much and especially the later horse events which often drew excitement.

On the whole the Directors will not be found whining; they pulled off a good day. Captain Mullooney and several soldiers were on King's business and 50 of them will be in Durham on Friday on the same recruiting purpose. The Bugle Band is also coming.

The Patriotic Society supplied meals in Irwin's warrooms and the hotel was well patronized.

The concert was successful, receipts amounting to \$90.00.
