

Effort to Restore Traffic on Interior Water Routes.

China is reported to be considering the restoration of the old canal system, of which there were at one time 60,000 miles within the empire. Centuries before the Christian era the great rivers of China were diverted from their natural courses, the waters of one turned into another's bed and the waterways carried along in the direction of desired traffic. The ancient Grand Canal extends from Hangchou to Tientsin, traversing the provinces of Chekiang, Kiang-

su, Shangtung and Chili, the total length of the canal being about 850 miles, says the Christian Herald. China is in desperate need of transportation, and it has been estimated by engineers that the canal system can be restored at a less cost than that which would be involved in the building of the necessary railways. With the canals again in operation the railway building can go on at greater leisure.
