Noble Ideals of Worthy Men

Quite an extraordinarily successful banquet was the one held in connection with the Annual meeting of the Liberal Club Federation of Ontario at London on October 11. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, N.W. Rowell, Hon. T.C. Norris, Prime Minister of Manitoba, Hon. Geo. Graham and S.W. Jacobs K.C. of Montreal were the leading speakers...

In their relation to the war he discussed three main issues—Prohibition, Nickel and Hydro. "The Legislature," he said "by the consent of both parties has put the responsibility of finally determining the Prohibition question upon the people themselves in a referendum and no political party dare withdraw from the people that right now conferred upon them..."

Mr. Rowell made a profound impression by his speech, in which he too declared with Sir Wilfrid Laurier that the war must be fought to a finish, firmly and resolutely as victory transcended in importance all other considerations and problems.

The Convention Nominees

The placing in the field of Barrister Wright of Owen Sound as Liberal candidate for South Grey, will come to many with some surprise, as his name was never mentioned in this connection as far as we know until the meeting of the Executive that called this convention. Never before did the Liberals of South Grey go out side of its borders to select a candidate and we hope the unusual step will be justified in its results by the plucking up for him at the next election of a large majority.

Mr. Calder, his opponent, is a Liberal, staunch and true, and for 25 years or more has rendered valuable and voluntary service for every Liberal candidate that took the field. His abilities are admitted, his claims on the position are not small, and now to be turned down when chances of victory were encouraging and a choice made outside the Riding, seems a smack of ingratitude and does not tend to stimulate the laudable ambition of young men within the riding.

However we hope it only "seems" so. Mr. Wright is an able man, a good speaker, conversant with public affairs and we hope to see him elected with a sufficiency of other Liberals throughout the Dominion to restore to power Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who gave Canada the best 15 years in its history and felt trying to make it better.

Had Mr. Moore A. Miller seen his way to accept a nomination, there is no doubt at all but that he would have got it unanimously and would undoubtedly have been elected to fill the seat his father held so worthily for seven years.

A resolution of regret at the loss of H. H. Miller and appreciation of his services to the Liberal party of the riding and to the country at large, was unanimously carried at the Convention by an impressive silent standing vote.

The Meat Supply

It would be contrary to experience if the high prices of meats were to result in a depletion of the herds on this continent. It is rather to be anticipated that production will, on the whole, be stimulated and the herds increased. If that is not the result, we should say that prices are not yet high enough to attract labor and capital to animal industry. High prices are largely due to the war, which makes an unusual demand for meat not only for the soldiery but for the prosperous

artisans of Britain and America. The war also interferes with shipping and limits the supply from South America. When the war ends, the supply will probably be found adequate to meet a demand reduced by cessation of the generous feeding of the soldiery and by the frugal living, which hard times will impose on all classes. —Sun

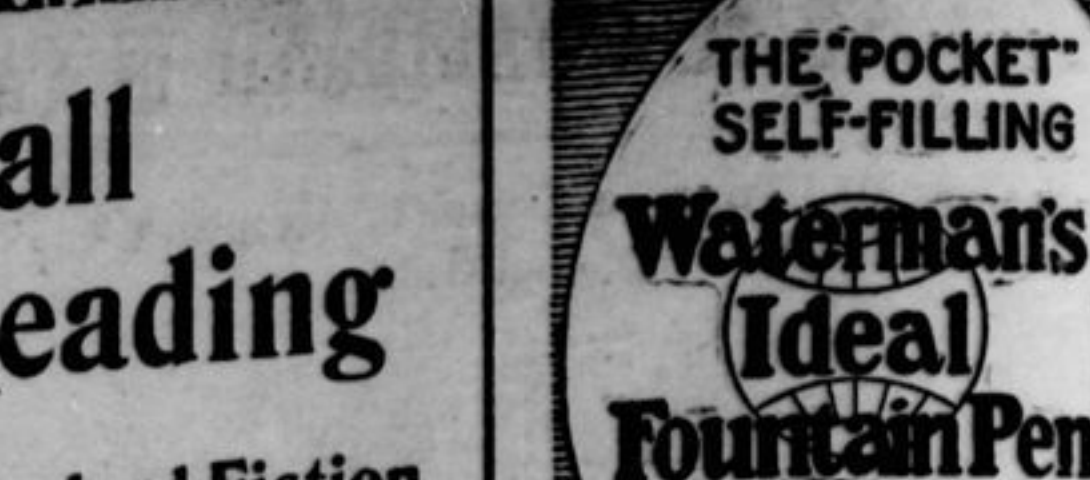
