James Bryce, historian, scholar and a measurer of words, is forced to say "history has never recorded, never hinted at, such a hecatomb." The sacrifices of primitive barbarians fade into insignificance in comparison with the systematic slaughter of Armenian men and with the equally well organized despoliation of their wives and daughters.

What is the significance of this demoniac outburst? Politically, let us hope, it foretells the freeing of the Armenians from Turkish rule. The Turks have proved themselves forever unfit to exercise control over a race loyal to another religion. Since Islam will not tolerate religious liberty, civilization cannot tolerate the continuance of Turkish rule over alien


