### PRICEVILLE AND LIMES

November's chilly winds makes fields and forests bare. It is something unusual to have thunder and lightning accompanied by a snow storm. This is what we had on Thursday evening, 2nd inst but the snow disappeared as fast as it came.

It's hard times by a large number of people as the price of everything in the shape of staples is going up. Everybody is buying up flour and potatoes. In the olden times when the early settlers came to the woods, the first few acres they cleared was put in with wheat. Sometimes it would be a failure on account of frosts. But that didn't discourage the new beginner for next year, he sowed some of the frozen wheat and had an excellent crop.

What do we find now? Some of our best farmers don't sow a grain of wheat. The old farmer thought he had no crop if he hadn't wheat. By all appearances flour will be away up to the dozen mark before next July. In the year 1869 flour was \$12 a barrel and hard to get at that price. The several township councils ordered several hundred barrels of cornmeal

### How Jack Weir Died

Don. McKinnon writes home in kindly terms of deceased.

The following interesting extracts are from a letter received at his home in Priceville on Monday, from sergt. Donald L. McKinnon, now at the front:

"I am afraid I have had news for you—news of little Jack Weir. You will remember I said I saw him two or three times up around the front lines, but the last time the battalion came out I missed him and so was somewhat anxious, knowing what they had suffered. Well, last night I was just coming out and met his battalion going in and I, at once, made inquiries. One of the sergeants told me that Jack was killed on Sept. 26, in a trench, now in our possession.

He was a bomber and with the other lads, always gay; he was leading an attack. The boys all seemed so sympathetic and had such good to say of him. Since that time of course, we have been over that ground time and again and though I have seen somewhat on the lookout I have seen no trace of him. I particularly enquired as to his being buried and though they could give me no definite assurance, they all seemed to think that the next day a burial party was on hand and carried his body away. I will always be looking, so may happen to run across his grave, if so I will let you know. You must write his father and aunt and tell them of him. Express to them my sincere regret at his loss. He was a fine lad and I remarked when last I saw him how healthy and clean he appeared, despite the conditions. They must not worry over his early death—the cause is surely worthy—knowing his early life, the sorrowing they must think of him with pride and look to another meeting where earthly wars are forgotten. Jack, himself, I know, would not have wished otherwise. He undertook to do his part and no one ever did it better nor with more cheerful heart, that is the great thing.

I was very sorry to see by the "Review" of the death of Mr. H. H. Millor. It came as quite a surprise to me and to the community in general. I read to all the boys the obituary of John McDonald in the Priceville columns. I do like his material.

You ask, mother, if I am ever sick. Let me assure you once again that I hardly know the meaning of that word. The mud and the irregular living seems only to sharpen my appetite and I'm always hungry and, of course, when one is eating right, everything is well. Beans is one of the main issues out here—canned pork and beans made right in Simcoe, and I can make a can of beans look pretty small nowadays, either cold, or if baked at camp, hot. And then, everyone, when at camp, soaks the bread in the bacon fat and that helps to keep out the wet, and to ward off any ill-effects."
