Monastir Captured

Well done Serbs and French who a few days ago captured this Serbian city taken from them at the big drive a year ago. This is reckoned one of the great events of the year and will give the Bulgars something to think about. The Allies are "cutting the claws" of the Greek king. Evidence of contemplated treachery is accumulating and the Allies are demanding the surrender of all artillery, arms and ammunition and the sending home of the ministers of the four central powers. He has from the first been an unscrupulous rascal and needed constant watching. These latest demands may not be complied with.

On all other fronts except one the Allies are doing well. That one is Western Rumania where F. Ikenhahn the German, is making gains. Suspicious efforts are being made to save Rumania, and this may be done yet. The submarine warfare is not slackening. Germany, it is known is feverishly building more and larger ones, and to meet the menace British experts are devoting much thought. The neutral world should be again shocked by the latest German barbarism: nothing less than the practical enslaving of the male Belgian population who are being drafted to Germany to work at anything that will free Germans to go fighting. The Pope is believed will enter a strong protest and one might hope that Pres. Wilson, now firmly seated, would show resentment.

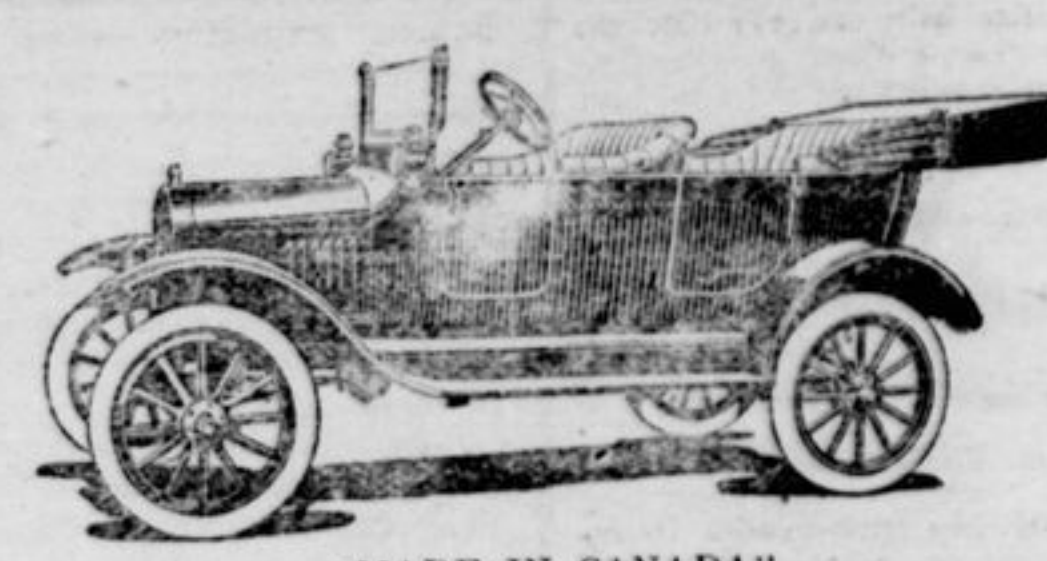
