The Loyalty of Liquor

Last week for the fourth time since Sept. 16th last, The Review refused liquor advertising that might have meant many dollars to us. The pages of the Daily Mail and Empire and the News are sometimes thick with ad vertisements offering facilities to obtaining liquor by ordering through Montreal or elsewhere outside of the Province and delivery being made here. Never was there such a campaign to get people to drink, to order S boze, to lay in winter stock, etc.

Why this urgency? The Government and Legislature of Ontario as last session, responding to the wishes of the people, passed unanimously a law to restrain the use of liquor as a beverage during war time at least. They recognized it as an evil, an injary to the country. a deterrent of military effectiveness and thus a menace to our soldier boys. Toronto and other communities, urban ano rural, testify to the benefit of this law passed by a unanimous legislature and what do we see?

We see the liquor interests trying to break down this law, by destroying its effectiveness! Taking advantage of a loop-hole, with almost Ger man devilishness, they would encourage liquor drinking with all its gance the sentiment that made a unanimous legislature, they insul the intelligence of the best classes of citizens everywhere, they are doing enemy work and in so doing they are

We hope the Logislature at its coming session will devise some means of stopping this propaganda. Black shame on papers that lend themselves tor lucre to liquor interests. Always an evil, it is now more than ever an enemy, a traitor within the camp, and as traitor it should be dealt with.
