The Loyalty of Liquor

Last week for the fourth time since Sept. 16th last, THE REVIEW refused liquor advertising that might have meant many dollars to us. The pages of the Daily Mail and Empire and the News are sometimes thick with advertisements offering facilities for obtaining liquor by ordering through Montreal or elsewhere outside of the Province and delivery being made here. Never was there such a campaign to get people to drink, to order booze, to lay in winter stock, etc.

Why this urgency? The Government and Legislature of Ontario at last session, responding to the wishes of the people, passed unanimously a law to restrain the use of liquor as a beverage during war time at least. They recognized it as an evil, an injury to the country, a deterrent of military effectiveness and thus a menace to our soldier boys.

We see the liquor interests trying to break down this law, by destroying its effectiveness. Taking advantage of a loop-hole, with almost German devilishness, they would encourage liquor drinking with all its attendant evils, they flout with arrogance the sentiment that made a unanimous legislature, they insult the intelligence of the best classes of citizens every where, they are doing enemy work and in so doing they are traitors.

Wintering Idle Horses

Experiments show that horses do well on a daily ration of one pound mixed hay, one pound of a raw and one lb carrots or swedes for each 100 lbs of their weight. So says a lengthy article sent out from the Ottawa Dept. of Agriculture. The change from heavy feeding to idle rations and vice versa should be gradual. If kept in box stalls it is not necessary they should be out much. If not exercised, bran should form part of the ration to prevent constipation. Feeding twice a day is sufficient about same quantity morning and evening.

Always Too Late

Just what amount of pressure is necessary to persuade the Ontario Government to take action? Let us sign of the most lamentable sort has been the result of every department of the government and nothing seems to be done until the government is simply driven to it.

The latest example of this is Mr. Ferguson's announcement of a re-organization of the Forestry and Fire Prevention Service of Ontario. Talk about "locking the stable door after the horse is stolen!" In spite of the terrible warning of the 1911 fire in Northern Ontario; in spite of the enormous wreckage of property, the government as a progressive policy, the government year after year neglected its duty, until this summer came the still more disastrous northern fire, destroying hundreds of human lives and millions of dollars worth of property.

Not long ago the Ottawa Journal, one of the leading Conservative papers of Canada, described the policy of the Ontario Government as a "provincial disgrace." "In the matter of forest fire protection," said the Journal, "this province has shown an amazing lack of progressiveness and intelligence. It is doubtful if there is a community in this or any other continent that has suffered more in life and treasure in recent years from forest fires than the province of Ontario. It is certain that none has shown greater feebleness or negligence in dealing with the problem."

Now the government has announced, in answer to a deputation, a re-organization of the Forestry Department and the appointment of Mr. E. J. Zivitz as chief of the new department. Time will show how effective the re-organization is, but in the meantime the government obviously stands convicted of the most appalling lethargy and neglect in the years between 1911 and 1916.

We are all anxious for the weather to give us more favourable weather before our box social comes off.

Last week Miss McGarity received a letter from her brother Signaller John E. McGarity from "Somewhere in France and is in parts as follows: "Our battalion was in the trenches last time for over a week and then came out for a rest. The fighting around here is good and stiff but we are digging right in and driving Fritz back steadily. Some of the trenches we captured had dug-outs in them 40 ft deep so you see we had to use some force to drive them out. A great many prisoners are being taken by the Allies and I don't see what keeps them all from giving in. The Hun fire is bad enough but we pour twenty times the amount on them and that is kept up continually. The surrounding country is just one continuation of large shell holes and dead bodies. The mud is fierce but we are used to that now. I think I could sleep nicely in a mud puddle. Two of our signallers were wounded and one killed the last time we were in. When we came out we marched to a small town, had a fairly good bath and clean underclothes so we are quite comfortable. I hadn't a wash or shave for eight days so try to imagine what I looked like. I am glad you are knitting socks for we sure appreciate them over here. I got mother's parcel while I was in the trenches and it went fine.

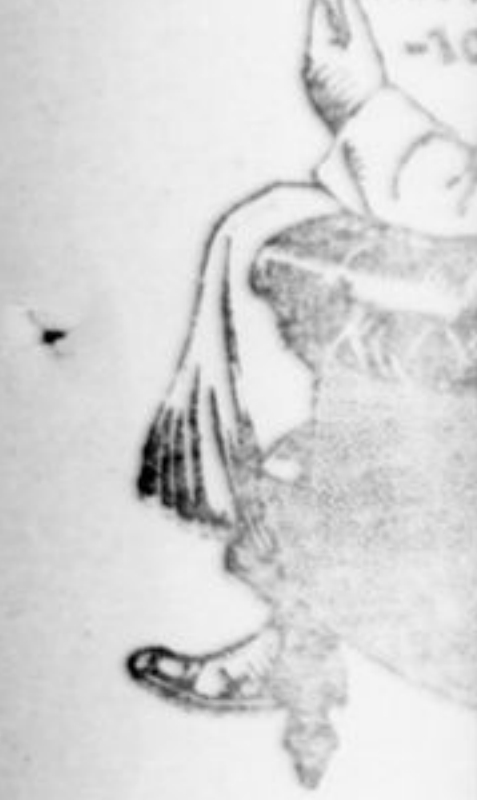
