The Late John Sutherland.

On Tuesday of this week, the mortal
remains of the above gentleman were
laid to rest in Trinity Church cemetery
beside those of his wife who predeceas-
ed him over thirteen years ago. He
died at his home in Fort William on 30
Dec. and the remains reached the
home of his sister Mrs W B Vollet, on
Monday night. He had reached the
patriarchal age of over 82 years.

Mr Sutherland was born in Plymouth,
England, came to this country with his
parents in boyhood, got his education
here and for some time was in business
here in early Durham days. His father
was the first baker in Durham. Deceas-
ed moved from Durham to Hamilton
where he was employed as a traveller
for one of the city's biggest firms, later
we find him in business in Toronto, then
again and for the last 20 years has been
a resident of Fort William.

His family consists of two sons and
one daughter. Munro, Manager of one
of the Toronto banks, Douglas conducts
a brokerage and insurance business in
Fort William. Miss Gertie, who has
been the light of his life. Besides his
only surviving sister, Mrs Vollet, one
brother Robert lives in Toronto.

Rev. Mr. Hawkins, of Trinity, con-
ducted appropriate services at Mr Vol-
let's home, assisted by Rev. Mr Morris,
of Shelburne. Many floral offerings and
the presence of old friends spoke of love
and respect. His three children were
all present.

the patient in bed for a time.

Chum of Late Sergt. Marshall
Mrs. R. Marshall on Monday received
the letter below which brings a mel-
ancholy satisfaction to the bereaved
ones, though it opens the wounds afresh.
Last week she got a package of Cald-
well's things sent by Pte. Lance Mc-
Girr with sympathetic regards.
Following is the letter:
France, Nov. 25, 1916
Dear Mrs Marshall,
I consider it my duty, although a sad
one to tell you what I know of the
death of your dear son, Caldwell. I
hope you won't count me forward writ-
ing to you. My home is in Walkerton
where my father is Pres. minister. I
met Caldwell two years ago and we
have been great pals. We enlisted in
the same Co. in the 71st Battalion and
took the same course in Woodstock
last December. I always found him a
gentleman both in public and private
and a good, decent fellow with the
boys. The news of his death came as
a great shock to me when I heard it
yesterday.

But what a noble death was his!
He was killed while bombing his way
up a German trench, at the head of
his section, during one of our advances
and I am glad to say he did not suffer.
Doubtless he did not know anything
ever hit him.

We are moving out of this place in a
day or two and I am glad of it. Will
Mrs. Marshall I must close, again ex-
tending to you my sincere sympathy
in the loss of your son and my pal.
