New Year's Message from the Governor-General

Ottawa, Dec. 30.—His Excellency, the Governor-General as president of the Canadian Patriotic Fund has issued the following New Year's appeal on behalf of the Fund;

Twice his Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught appealed to the people of Canada in support of the Canadian Patriotic Fund. The generous and prompt response on each occasion proves how truly Canada appreciates the debt which she owes to her sons who are fighting for the Empire.

Fifty five thousand families, comprising one hundred and fifty thousand individuals, are to-day dependent upon the fund and it is estimated that twelve million five hundred thousand dollars will be required to meet the requirements of the next twelve months.

The sum is a large one but when the circumstances are fully realized I am confident that the people of Canada will willingly contribute the amount necessary for the fund to continue its patriotic and beneficent work.

A Win-the-War Fund

The Fund referred to is the Patriotic Fund for which an active campaign will shortly be waged. The campaign is meant to ensure the raising of six million dollars in 1917 for the purpose of aiding dependents of soldiers at the front.

The Allies Firm

The reply of the Allies,—representing Belgium, France, Great Britain, Italy, Japan, Montenegro, Portugal, Rumania, Russia, Serbia,—has been made to Germany. It is a dignified document setting forth lucidly, but firmly, the intention of the Allies to accept no peace till reparation is made for the past and guarantees given for the future that are not to be considered as scraps of paper.

Their reply to the United States will be made shortly and will we hope convince Pres. Wilson of their motives in the war—something he does not seem to have grasped—and we would suggest that no better close could be made to their reply than just to quote to him the famous words of Lincoln, that they are striving for the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth.

Liberals will fight West Simcoe

Mr Isaac Scott, farmer of Nottawasaga Township, was selected by a Liberal Convention held at Alliston to choose a candidate for the constituency of West Simcoe, made vacant by the death of the late Hon. Jas. Duff. Mr. Scott is an out and out farmer and has attained a competency as he himself puts it, by his "bare hands" all by farming.

The chief speakers at the gathering were Mr. C. M. Bowman, M. P., Chief Liberal Whip, and Mr. R. Hartley Dewart, K. C., M. P. P. In their addresses both paid tributes to the late Mr. Duff.

Mr. Bowman dealt with Machine Gun waste. \$500,000 had been contributed by the Ontario Government to the Federal Government to buy Machine guns without any careful attention to the needs of the situation or the value of the guns. Five hundred guns had been bought of a make which has been rejected by the United States authorities and Mr. Bowman remarked "If we could urse that purchase to-day, I am confident we should find that huge sum of money on the scrap heap. If this is so one quarter of the total amount raised by assessing a tax of one mill on the dollar on all property in the province has been wasted in this one transaction.

Mr. Hartley Dewart, K. C., M. P. P., rebuked the government for not having the courage to appoint a Minister of Agriculture but leaving it at any rate for the time being in the hands of the Prime Minister who was already overburdened with work.

Mr Dewart also reviewed the nickel situation, emphasizing particularly

the failure of the government to collect the legal amount of taxation from the International Nickel Co. and the illegal agreement it had made with this company, allowing it to escape in this last year over \$370,000 which it rightly owed and this too at the very time when the citizens of the province in city and country alike were being heavily taxed and were gladly paying taxes to aid in the war. Here was a company rolling in wealth and profits acquired from war business and allowed by the government to escape payment of huge sums legally owing to the Provincial Treasury.

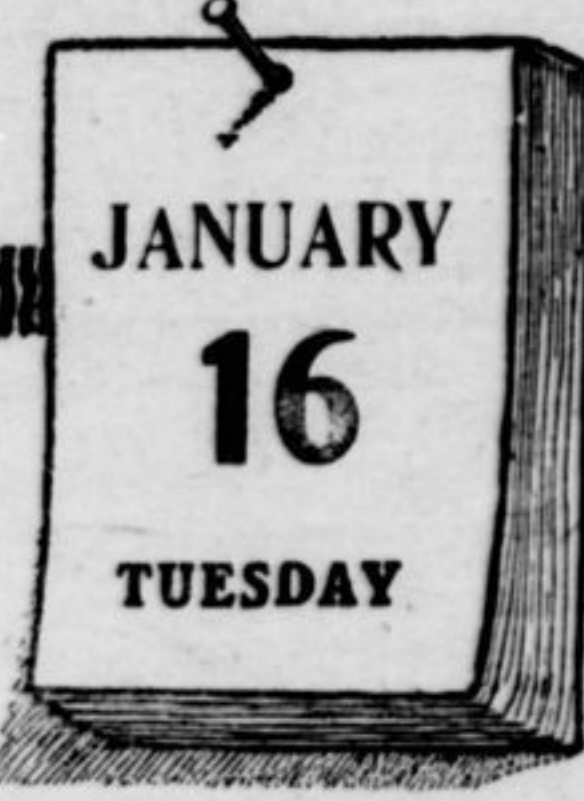
