National Service

The most critical moment in the history of our nation and empire is being taken, none too soon, in Canada, to meet it. The war cannot continue indefinitely. The expenditure of men and material resources is proceeding at too great a rate for any nation, even the most powerful, to stand the strain much longer. On both sides, preparation is being made to concentrate

every man and every available resource upon a supreme effort. Unless the German effort be utterly beaten down by a far greater effort on the part of Britain and her Allies, we shall have failed to win the war and our sacrifices all will have been in vain. This is the solemn warning of the new Prime Minister of England, Mr. Lloyd-George when he says: "Unless not merely the material resources but the labour of the country is used to best advantage, and everyman is called upon to render such service to the State as he can best give, victory is beyond our reach." The words were addressed to the people of England, but the message is for Canada as well. Every man in Canada, as in England, owes to the State his best services in the present emergency. Where his services can most effectively be rendered is not within the power of the individual to determine. That must be the task of the National Service Commission, which, as a preliminary step, has asked for a voluntary enrolment of the man-power of Canada. The response should be prompt and unanimous. No one should dare to neglect the appeal when the issue of the war is hanging in the balance. There is appropriate aid in winning the war to be given by every man in Canada, whether it be to produce food, or to make munitions, or to help transport them, or to fight. By enrolling ourselves, we enable the State to turn to best account the greatest of our resources, the man-power of the country, and we contribute to the attainment of the complete victory for which every Canadian should strive.

"Less Religion, more Christianity"

The two incidents below are from a letter from the front to J. A. Hunter. One describes Confirmation Services in the trenches.

"As you know these services are held outdoors and they pile up a few manila boxes or biscuit boxes, throw a flag over them, put a candle and cross on top, and the Bishop conducts the service, the men coming forward in the open. A Roman Catholic bishop heard they were going to have these services outdoors and offered the Bishop of London the chapel in his convent near by, which the Bishop accepted. The men were notified and they all went up to the chapel. When they got there they found that the benches would seat only thirty-two, and as there were over 150 of them present they carried the benches outside and they all stood. Every rank of the service from a full Colonel to privates in the ranks and every arm of the service were represented."

The second incident took place in a barn, floor covered with straw. "There was a young chap brought in and the Doctor said he could not last than half an hour at the most. He turned out to be a Roman Catholic and wanted his priest so that he could die in peace. They could not find a Roman Catholic priest and could not find a Jewish Rabbi and in his own way he put it up to him and told him what was trump and told him he had to fix this young man so he could die in peace. The Jewish Rabbi thought a moment or two and said he would do it. He just knew enough of the Roman Catholic service to go in and give the chap, as he thought, absolution, held up the cross and let him die in peace with his God, his conscience and his church." All of which goes to show that in the presence of death, humanitarian feeling overrides religious differences.

In fact we seem to have been the exception in that respect. It looks now as if we were to be made a training battalion our ranks being filled up from other troops coming from Canada. The
