A Suggestive Coincidence.

An interesting fact has developed in connection with the Patriotic Fund. It has been found that, broadly speaking, the sums graated from the Fund, as supplementary to the separation allowance and assigned pay, bring the total income of families on the Fund, in each province to a parity with the in each province to a parity with the cost of living as estimated by the Dominion Government's Labor Bureau. This result goes to confirm the substantial accuracy of the Labor Bureau's estimates, and also indicates that the administrators of the Patriotic Fund in each province are keeping that in each province are keeping their grants reasonably close to the actual wants of the people dependent on it.

Naturally, the cost of living increases as we move westward, and therefore the grants from the Fund increase also. For illustration, the average grant in Prince Edward Island is about \$10.00 per month, while in British Columbia it is nearly \$21.00. The average it is nearly \$21.00. 
