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Aaron Wenger Has Passed Away

To-day Tuesday, the mortal remains of this well-known citizen are being interred in the cemetery of the little village of Ayton. He died on the 13th February, and funeral was delayed to admit of the presence of a son from the West. The cause of death we have not heard, but for some time his health has been uncertain; his age was well up in the 70's. Some years ago he met with a severe accident, having his leg broken and other injuries, but made a surprising recovery though no doubt it lowered his vitality.

Deceased was undoubtedly the best known man in his township and "Wenger of Ayton" was well-known throughout S. Grey and beyond it. He and his brother Nwab, (deceased many years) succeeded their father in a flour milling business, which early took on important dimensions. They were good business men, and not only the flourmill prospered, but also did General store, the Sawmill and later the Creamery, which last perhaps made him more widely known than any of the other activities.

Deceased was a member of and a stand-by in the Presbyterian church whose services he greatly valued. He was public-spirited in every way, well-read on current events, and a most ardent Liberal in politics. Not once or twice but many times he could have been the candidate of his party, but steadily declined. He had a cheery optimistic nature and his presence at Liberal Conventions will be missed.
