The Late Noble Wilson

One of the oldest settlers of Egremont, passed away at his home at Boothville on Tuesday, 27th Feb., in his 74th year, after four weeks illness.

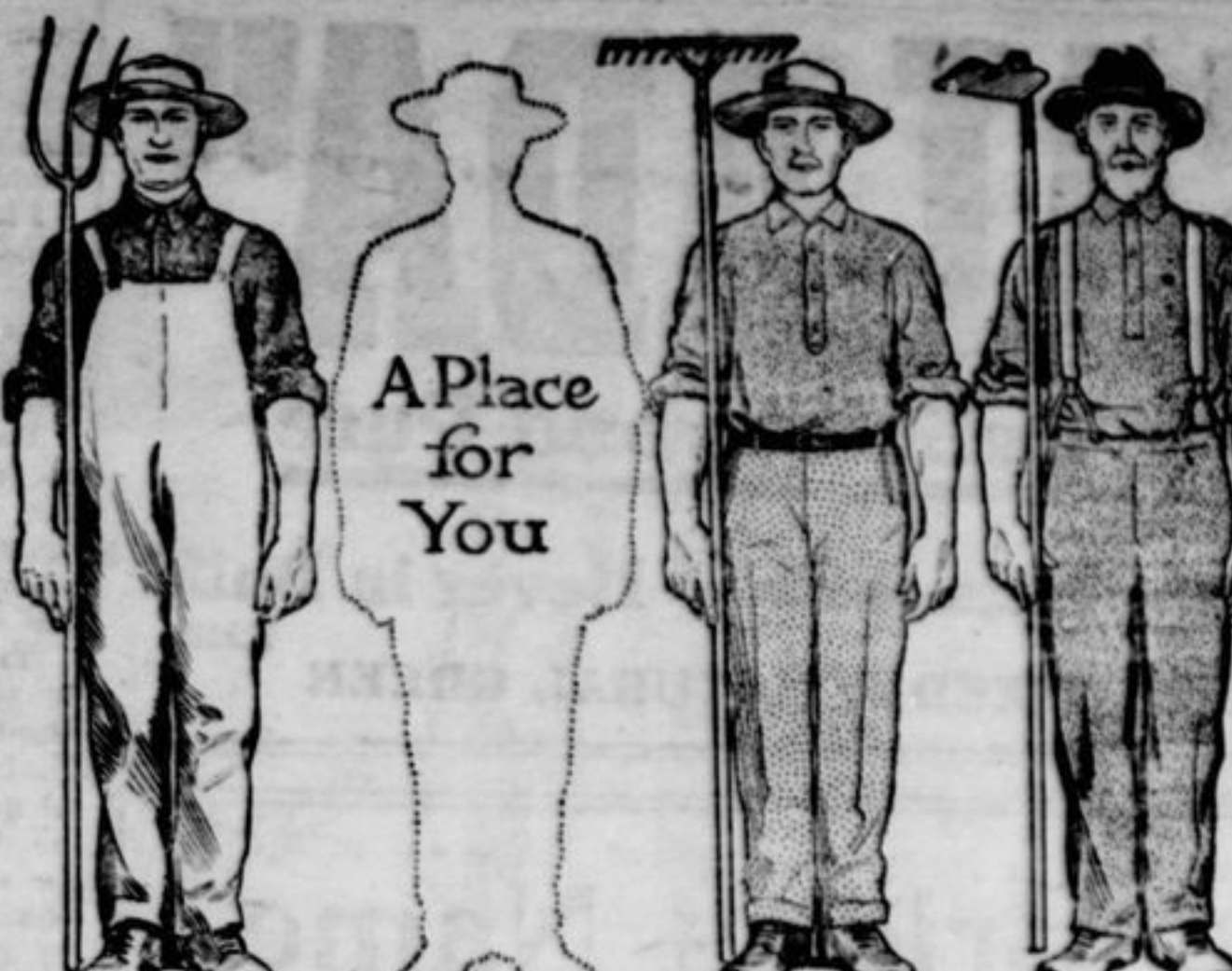

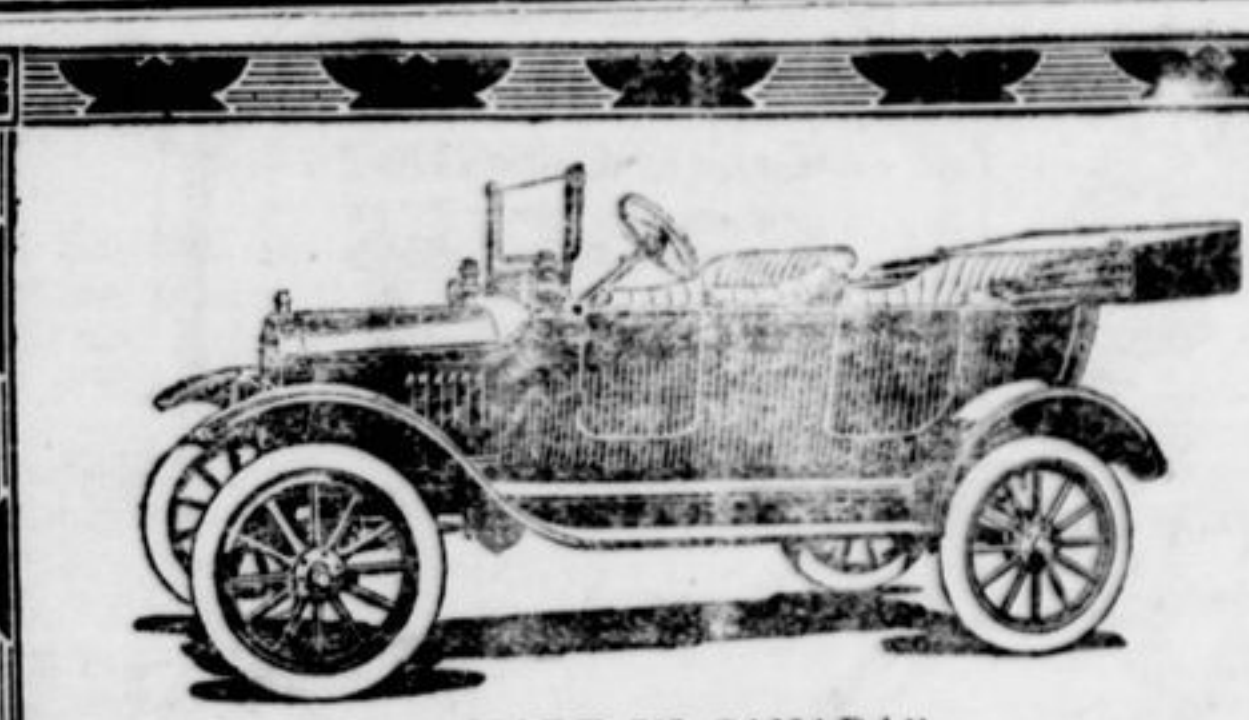
