Shot by Policeman.

A despatch from Sault Ste Marie says: In an encounter with Police Constable Peter Jones of the Michigan Soo last Tuesday, W J Dunsmoor, formerly a member of the 27th Battalion, was shot and killed on the ferry docks when he was trying to get away from the police and get on the ferry boat for the Canadian side.

Dunsmoor was charged with having stolen ten dollars from the Hickler Hotel in the Michigan Soo, and when approached by the police at the docks he delivered a couple of kicks in the stomach of a policeman, who fell to the ground. Dunsmoor then took the policeman's baton away and started to batter him about the head. The policeman regained consciousness sufficiently to reach his revolver, the contents of which he emptied into his assailant, the fifth bullet entering Dunsmoor's stomach and causing his death a few minutes later.

Dunsmoor had frequently been in the toils of the police in Canada, and but a short time ago was released from prison where he had been confined for desertion from his battalion.

Constable Jones is now lying in the Michigan Soo Hospital, not expected to live.

Ernest McDonald is now home in khaki, having signed last week with the 64th Battery, Can. Field Artillery, Guelph.

After receiving no word from him for over a month, the relatives of Lt. Thos. Allan at the front were relieved to hear from him last week. He is in good health. Pte. Johnston Allen, who is recovering in an English hospital, had received no home mail for weeks, when, as he relates in a letter home, he was overjoyed to receive sixty letters in one day.

248th Battalion Notes. It has been learned that all but about one company of the 147th Bn. have been sent to France. It is up to the citizens of Grey who hold the 147th in high regard to fill the ranks of the battalion the losses of the 147th may be made up from Grey County. The 248th when ready for overseas will join the 8th Reserve; and if Grey citizens wish to see the superiority of the 147th maintained, they must send more men to strengthen it, in the 248th.

Every patriotic citizen of Grey has a chance to answer the war and feathering threat made in Normanby against the 248th recruits thereby increasing their efforts to fill the ranks of the battalion in two months. Let extra effort be your answer to the threat.
