How Lee-Corp. Halliday Met with Death

Appreciative Letter from Chaplain

Our Yeovil cor. three weeks ago reported the death in action of Lance-Corporal J. W. Halliday of Winnipeg an old Yeovil boy, who for a number of years was with Mr Jas. McLean. The following fine letter from his chaplain was recently received by the deceased's sister, Mrs Haight, of Toronto, and will be appreciated by many old schoolmates and friends:

Dear Mrs Haight: It is my sad duty to inform you that Lance Corporal J W Halliday, No 461280 of the 44th Canadian Infantry was killed in action on Feb 3rd 1917. Of the action in which he was killed, I can tell you this that so splendid was the conduct of our men that they were warmly congratulated by their officers commanding and later received the thanks of the Brigadier—unfortunately a number fell. them. He particularly distinguished himself and for his gallant conduct was mentioned in despatches. His comrades saw him fall, death was instant so that he was spared suffering. I regret that it was impossible at that time to bring the body in for burial—perhaps a better moment is the place he holds in the hearts and memory of his comrades. What this tragic news means to you I realize. May it give help in your grief to know he died so gallantly—AN HONOR TO THE UNIFORM HE WORE. May God give you help and healing in your sorrow and give to you and all who are passing through these deep waters strength to endure the sacrifice the country has called on you to make in its just cause.

National Service Cards

With the approach of the date upon which all National Service Cards are to be turned in, there will naturally be some anxiety on the part of those who did not consider the matter of sufficient importance to impel them to sign them. Their neglect to do so is likely to bring a penalty upon them. There are numerous penalties that might be imposed, but without a doubt: the proper and logical one is disenfranchisement. The failure of the National Service effort can be attributed to the week-kneed and vacillating general policy of the Government. The official utterance of Mr R. B. Bennett and other National Service officials did not convince the public that the plan was effectively being worked out, and it is doubtful if the money spent upon it will be justified by results.

However, the question now is:—What is to be the penalty imposed on those poor-spirited individuals, who, either did not sign the cards or who deliberately gave incorrect and irrelevant answers to questions asked? Quite recently we read in the daily press, that at a meeting held in Montreal, one of the speakers advised his hearers not to sign the cards. Now, if such advice did not constitute an act of treason, we would like to know by what other term it might be described.

From the way in which the Conservative press is ignoring all reference to National Service, it might be inferred that the Government is anxious that it should as soon as possible be lost sight of.—O. S. San.
