Unanimous resolution passed at a full meeting of Tarrant Grange, North Egremont, April 4th: "In view of the great expenditure caused by the war and the high cost of living, entailed thereby and whereas the proposition of having an automobile highway from Windsor to Ottawa is detrimental to the interests of the farming community as a whole and of no benefit to the overwhelming majority of farmers. Therefore be it resolved that we enter our unqualified protest against this uncalculated expenditure and whereas in view of the proposed bill to regulate cooperative organizations before the House, be it resolved that organized Agricultural Interests be given full opportunity to express their views and opinions before anything definite is done in regard to the matter, and that a copy of these resolutions be sent to our representative at Toronto."

Nanton, Alta. who visited her a few weeks ago and her aged mother in her 92nd year who lives with her daughter, Mrs Struthers.
