Two of them, Ples, Victor Catton and Ray Fluker, belonging to the former 147th Batt. Victor was slightly wounded in the leg and taken to No. 3 General Hospital, Boulogne, France.

Mrs. Goforth tells of Honan Life.

Interesting services were those of the Presbyterian church on Sunday when Mrs. Jonathan Goforth, of Honan, China, gave addresses on life and conditions in that country as experienced by missionaries of the Presbyterian Church. Her husband with the appropriate name of "Goforth," was with a few others appointed about 28 years ago by the Pres. Church in Canada to proceed to Honan, a populous Chinese province, to found a Mission, and the story of its growth and development makes interesting reading.

The bitter, persecuting suspicious spirit of the early days, Mrs. Goforth says, is now gone. The missionary especially if he has doctor's degrees, is welcomed almost everywhere. The converts include men of high position even the President being a Christian, and gradually the great "sleeping giant" of the ages is coming to adopt Western ideas, and "open door" for missionary effort are more in evidence than men to enter them. The epics of Confucius are giving way before the epics of Christianity. The natives are coming to see that Confucius leads them only to the river of death but Jesus does more—he brings the gift of life that no one is and that to come.

China's heroic efforts to abolish the opium was dealt with. She is succeeding, but there has been formed a strong English-speaking Company who are flooding the country with millions of cigarettes, dipped in opium, and the good name of Britain is again smirched by this unscrupulous commercialism.

She tells an interesting story of the influence of one Ruth Paxton, who, even without a knowledge of the language, yields marvellous power; graphic descriptions of the heroic boldness of converts in the face of opposition, lights up her address. She is a firm believer in the efficacy of prayer and a list of remarkable answers to prayer within her knowledge is to appear in the Sunday School Times in May.
