PASSING OF THE PIONEERS.

We have completed our thirteenth Annual visit to the ratepayers of Glenelg, and we are at a loss how or where to begin to give a short sketch of this good old Township where we landed when but a very small boy, over three score years ago.

Where we attempted to follow up the happenings that transferred since that far away date it would fill many columns of the Review, but we will endeavour to confine our remarks as near as possible to the events of the present age, though some low or another our desire is to go away back to those years numbered with the past and consider for a while the staid old pioneers who landed first on the old Durham Road and Garafraza Road when the roads were in the natural state.

What they had to endure by way of hardships may be only as a story when told to the children and grandchildren by the aged fathers or mothers, if any are still living. We often have come across memories of the past for not seldom when tramping across old forsaken fields we come on to the ruins of the old cabins of 50 or 60 or more years ago.

The oldest resident living on the Garafraza road is Mrs Jessman who is nearing the century mark. It is said that she is the oldest person living of the old pioneers from Fergus to Owen Sound. It is 75 years since she and her husband settled at Dornoch or vicinity.

What hardships those old people had to endure is hardly believed by the present young generation, for they had to carry their provisions from Fergus to the woods of that far away time. Mrs Jessman's memory is all gone and getting childish so after all its not desirable to live till the reason is gone.

Mrs McArthur of the Glen is the oldest living on the Durham Road, she being in her 89th year and getting quite frail although she has all her faculties as good as ever.

We found many changes since a year ago in many homes in some places the good old mothers are gone and also the fathers, and some of the middle aged have passed away during the last few months and in some homes the dear boy who enlisted was killed in action of which were Goldwin Patterson son of Mr and Mrs Patterson of the 4th Con North, son of Mr and Mrs James Morrison of Traverston, and John, son of Mr Wm Veir all brave boys.

So all those homes bereft are like the women of old, they have only the garments that they wore before taking the soldiers uniform, as a reminder of the dear boys who fell defending their King and country. Many other homes have boys away, some at the Front and some in England or France all waiting to be called to duty if this cruel war continues.

Of the old pioneers living are Mr John Ellison of Glenelg who has passed his 86th year and is getting very frail and suffers excruciating pain from the effects of rheumatism and other ailments. Mr Thos Moran of Con 15 is another powerful man in his day, he is 87 years old and now he is lonely for his late partner died a few months ago, his memory is getting defective also, Mr Thos Mesgher of the 10th Con is another of the first pioneers of Proton near Swinton Park he has also passed his 87th year and his memory is failing also, Mrs McPhee another good old highland lady of the 70th Con is 84 and has all her faculties as good as ever, Mr Angus McVicar of the 4th Con, N. D. R. is another able bodied pioneer of old who is now 89 years and is most of his time confined to his bed, Mrs James Edge is another good lady that has passed 87 years and is quite smart yet. She was amongst the pioneers of Edge Hill in the early 40's, her folks being the Davieses who with the Edges were amongst the first settlers at Edge Hill.

Mr Dan McEachnie up further north is also getting frail he has passed the highest allotted age also, but his memory is good yet. Mrs John Weir another good lady who laments to have a vacant chair near the stove as her good partner has left her some months ago. She is also over the allotted age by a few years. Mr John McPhail of South Glenelg is another of the pioneers of Glenelg he is now 88 years and is quite smart he split and piled all the winter and summer wood and is doing some other chores around the barn and stables as well.

We must not forget Professor Konold who is over the 80 mark by some years and can tison music as good as he could when he entered the woods of Egrement near sixty years ago, he is a resident of the Durham Road for 40 years and is still a bright conversationalist with enlightened opinions as to the origin of the war and its likely results, Mrs Niehol of Con 2 E. G. R. is another good lady that has passed the four score by a few years and is very active for a lady of that age.

This train of thought reminds us of the beautiful lines of Sir Walter Scott: "The race of yore That danced our infancy upon their knees, And told our marvelling boyhood legends store, How are they blotted from the things that be!"

A few, all weak and withered of their course Wait on the verge of dark eternity Like stranded wrecks, the tide returning hoarse, Sweeps them from our sight— Time rolls his ceaseless course." (Continued next week.)
