May 7, Shorncliffe Camp St. Martin's Plains Kent Co. England.

Mr. Editor: Having received your valuable paper quite frequently since we took our little trip across the duck pond and find some very interesting home news in it although it is more or less stale by the time we receive it away down here among the hills of clay in Kent.

Will not write you a very long letter but will tell you about our last mobilization which was pulled off a fortnight ago.
