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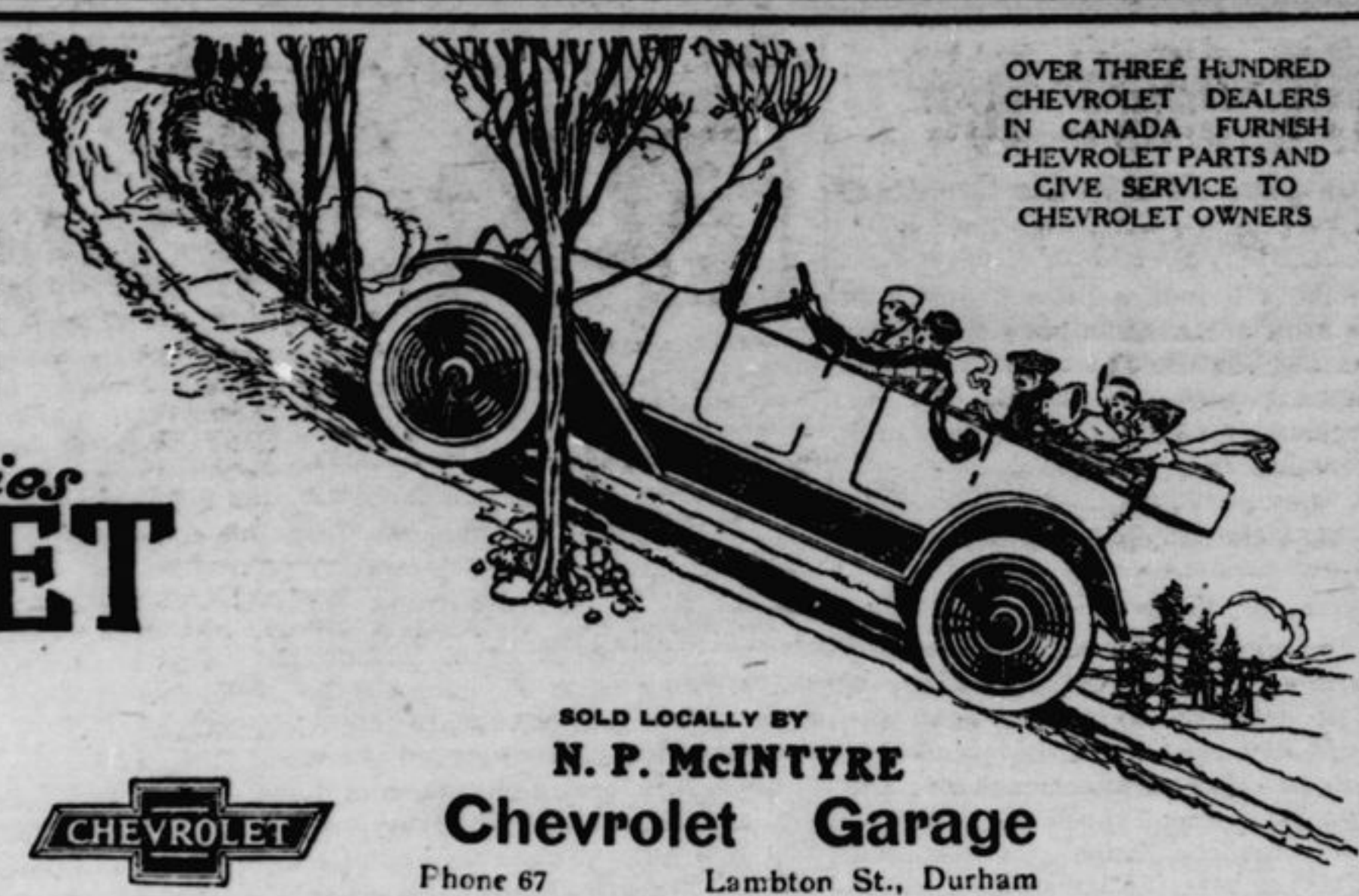

### Conscription Demonstration

Toronto Liberals are generally not a very prominent quantity about election times, but now and again they are galvanized into life and one of these occasions was on Saturday last.

With only 24 hours notice they succeeded in crowding Massey Hall from floor to rafters with an earnest crowd of citizens, the moving force being a pro-conscription feeling and the prospect of hearing Dr. Michael Clark M. P. for Red Deer, Alta., and Ontario opposition leader Mr. Rowell. Undoubtedly one of its purposes was to influence Ottawa on Monday following when Sir Robert Borden brought down his conscription measure.

Both the speakers named, Rev. Father Minnehan, and many others gave addresses in favor of conscription and the vast audience was electric with sympathy. Dr. Clark declared he would break with Sir Wilfred should he oppose conscription. He wanted the mobilization of everything; man power, material power, moral power, with only one end in view: the winning of the war.

Mr. Rowell who was greeted as he came forward as "the Lloyd-George of Ontario" spoke without reserve in favor of conscription of man-power, food and war materials and the organization of agricultural resources for the winning of the war. Mr. Rowell's attitude is unmistakable and may lose him some votes in localities where pro-German feeling prevails, but he hesitates not nor hedges, "principles before party" being his motto, and all right thinking men will support him. He urged strongly that the present crisis must not develop into a racial issue. Strong men of both races take opposite views. He made telling use of his visit to the front and the message the boys had given him "send us more men."

"I am here to say that, God being my helper, to the full measure of my ability and my strength, I stand to fulfill that pledge to the men who have gone overseas. (Loud applause.)

"I want to reiterate that while we want the man-power of Canada organized, we cannot permit the wealth in Canada to fail to take its just share of the burden of this war. Then we must face the whole problem of agricultural production, and see that so far as it is possible by the Government to prevent waste by the appointment of a food controller." (Applause.)

### War Notes

King Constantine of Greece has been forced to abdicate, by pressure from Britain, France and Russia. Traitorous designs there will now come to an end. Haig has made another notable advance this week, and Russia's attitude is becoming satisfactory. The United States is showing extraordinary zeal and the U-boat campaign is petering out. On the whole, the outlook is good. The latest news from Ottawa is not reassuring.

### British Victories

Thursday last was another red letter day for the British forces. The attack was in Belgium this time and though the enemy was aware it was coming it availed them not. The Irish, New Zealanders and Australians have the glory this time at the Messines ridge. About 7000 prisoners were taken, a substantial advance made and it has been held in spite of desperate counter attacks. The "iron ring" around Ypres is completely broken now. Hill 60 disappeared in a cloud of dust, the work of the air-men was superb, but the burning of the mines, long in preparation, right under the German hosts, was the feature that broke the morale of the enemy and roused the British. It was described as an earthquake. Haig is more than a match for Hindenburg.

The Stockholm Socialist gathering is said to have been postponed. We venture to say not with the consent of the Kaiser.

Sir Douglas Haig is the greatest discovery in Generals among the forces of Britain during this war. It is now largely Haig against Hindenburg.

McDongall—Shewell—That committee of McCallie, Brigham and McDongall be authorized to view sink hole at lot 2, con. 8 and have roadway repaired.—Carried.

Brigham—Shewell—That J. McDongall and A. McDonald be a committee to investigate into killing sheep and that council is of the impression that the highest prices have been stated in affidavits and the owners of dogs be located and made to settle according to law.—Carried.

McDongall—McDonald—That each commissioner be granted leave to expend \$250 in their respective divisions.—Carried.

Brigham—McDongall—That Reeve and Clerk be authorized to consult Robertson & McNab re Hydro by-laws.—Carried.
