The flowers are of a most brilliant red and the foliage of a light green. There are several named varieties which may be procured. The best grow to a height of a foot and a half to two feet at the time of blooming.

NO MORE ARTILLERY RECRUITS.—Until further notice no more recruits will be accepted for the Artillery branch of the Canadian forces, according to an official announcement made at Militia Headquarters, Ottawa. The cause of the order is apparently that the military authorities in England have all the artillery personnel that they require at the present time. The four Canadian divisions at the front are well supplied with artillery, and although the infantry branch of fifth division has been organized for it. As a consequence men have been transferred from artillery units to infantry units on their arrival in England, according to information reaching here. In addition word has been received from Ottawa that 26 artillery officers have been transferred to infantry units recently. It is thought, however, that the order is only temporary, and that as soon as artillerymen are required again, it will be rescinded. The full strength of the Ammunition Column is at Petawawa Camp, except for about 165 men at London and 75 at Guelph. It is probable these will soon also be moved to Petawawa.

Rev. Stephen Young Dead

This veteran preacher, for 40 years known to many in Saugeen Presbytery, died on the 3d inst. at his home in Clifford, aged 80 years. He came to Clifford in 1877 and for 34 years ministered to the Presbyterian congregation there. In 1913 he gave up the active duties of the ministry, but frequently took supply during vacancies until about a year ago when eyeight failed him. His wife died 17 months before him and two sons and two daughters survive him. He was born in Lunark Co., Ont. and graduated from Knox College in 1865, laboring for 11 years in Huron County before coming to Clifford.

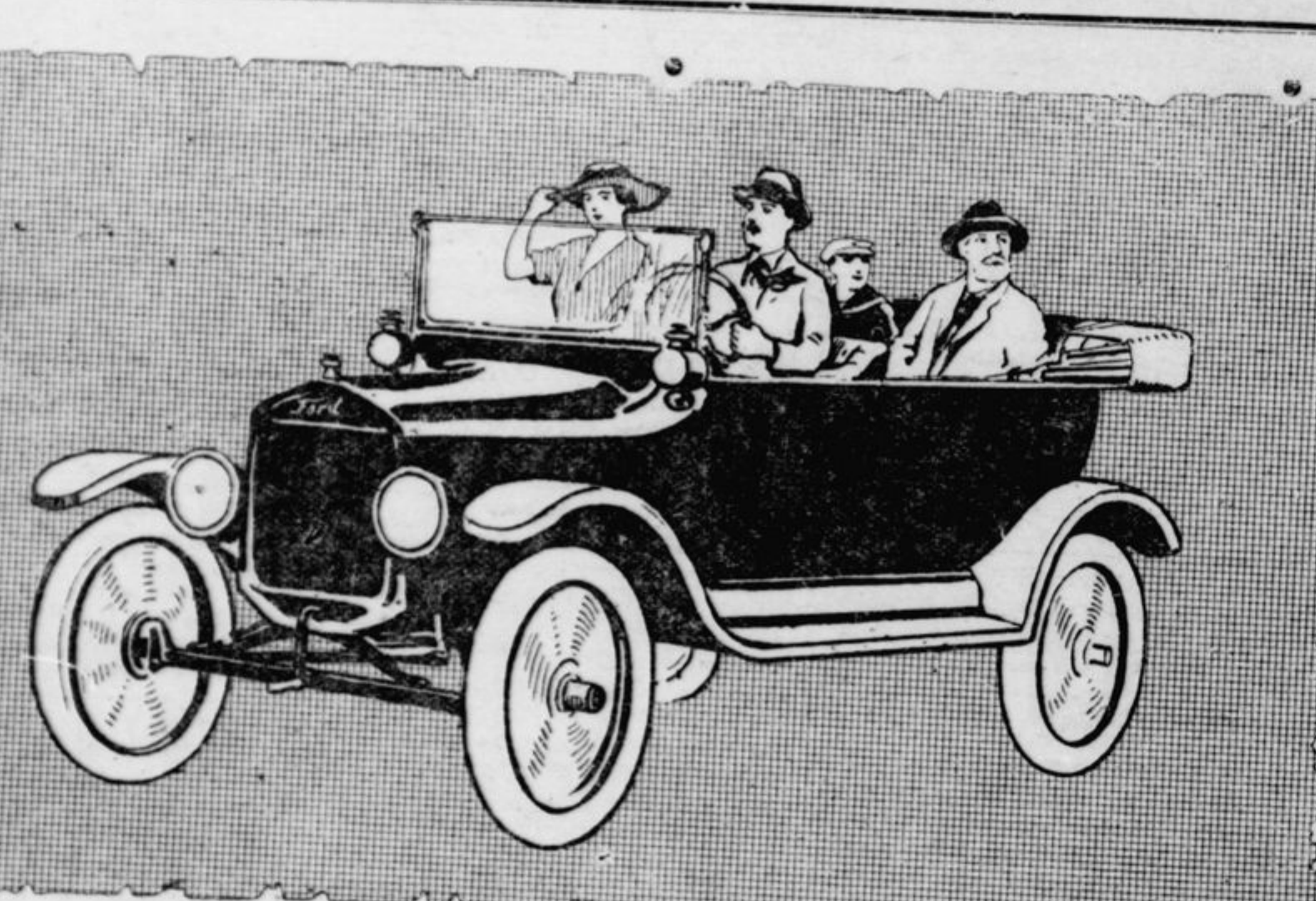
