The husbands of some of these women have already returned to Canada, yet the wives are caught on the other side of the ocean. Quite possibly it may take several years even after peace is declared to get them home again.

South Grey Women's Institute

Annual District Meeting in Durham

The Annual District Meeting of South Grey Women's Institute met in the Library here with a goodly number of delegates attending from Ayton, Dromore, Dornoch, Hanover, Holstein, Zion and Durham, the President, Mrs. Dr. Easton of Ayton, in the chair. Very encouraging reports were read by the various delegates of their work chiefly Red Cross, and how they raised money to carry on their work in addition to help, which some of the townships give to Red Cross societies. From the whole district was raised \$1328.62, and expenditure was \$1028.09, leaving a balance on hand of \$300.53. A vote was taken to give \$1 from each branch in the County, to support the County Institute which meets at Owen Sound this year, at which a large number was expected to attend from the various branches. After the business meeting was over a fine paper on "Books" was read by Mrs. D. P. Colledge of Holstein, who is so well fitted to speak on that subject. We hope to give it to our readers sometime in the future. The officers were all re-elected. Mrs. Dr. Easton of Ayton Pres., Mrs. W. Rogers, Holstein, Vice-President, Mrs. T. McGirr, Durham, Secy-Treas.

Those attending from Ayton were Mesdames Easton, Damm, Schnell, and another young lady, who with Mrs Easton sang Miss Hahn's fine patriotic song "On, Canadians, on" in excellent voice. Those present from Hanover were Mesdames Mills, Brandon and Taylor; from Holstein, Mesdames Rogers, Coleridge and Hershey; from Dromore, Miss Renwick, Mesdames Findlay, Henry and Hunter; from Dornoch, Mrs Dargavel and Miss Ivy, Mrs Campbell and Miss Glenna; from Zion, Misses Robson and Davis. Tea was served to all delegates and visitors and also to the delegates from the Farmers' Institute who were meeting at the same place upstairs in the Library. Altogether the meetings during the year were encouraging and a great help socially and practically.

Electric storms were quite severe in this locality last week. On Wednesday evening the barn and implement shed of Wm Wright, 8th con, Proton, was struck by lightning and burned. The loss is quite heavy as he had, we understand, only \$300 insurance. The buildings are located on a farm west of the home place. A number of implements were also burned. Mr. James Mitchell's stable in this village was struck in the same storm and had a narrow escape from being burned. Mr. Wright Irwin's barn, back line, Melanchoy was damaged slightly. Mr. George Dale's house in the village was struck on Thurs. day morning but luckily escaped with the chimney being knocked off and some traces of the electric fluid inside the house. The school in the same part of the village also had a close call.—Dundalk Herald.


