PRICEVILLE AND LIMITS

Four of the immediate friends of Mr Neil McCannell were engaged for a couple of days last week removing the remains of Mr McCannell's father, Neil McCannell who died in Montana; to the Smellies cemetery to McNeil's cemetery, Priceville. In reading the inscription on the monument we found the first to be Mr McCannell's great grandmother, born in 1770 and died in 1854.
