The pine blister disease has gained a strong foothold in the northeastern United States, and has been discovered also in Ontario and in Quebec. In the former province, the situation is most serious in the Niagara peninsula. The white pine forests of Canada are valued at \$200,000,000, so that the most thorough measures are justifled for the protection of this great as-The young forest growth suffers most severely from this disease, the railways collected only 7.51 mills, and it is of the greatest importance that the large area of white pine reproduction in eastern Canada receive The rate charged in the United States protection, in order that they may for similar service in 1915 was 7.380 Style of Body Armor for Protection of reach maturity and add their quota mills, or about 1-8 of a mill less per

You pay him what you will, he dares not chaffer about prices with

a white man. On the great plantations and in the mines the Indian is a virtual slave. There is no free agricultural labor on the west coast. Four days a week the peon must work for the great landowners at the munificent wage of ten cents a day. The rest of the time he may devote to his own acre or two, which, must feed and clothe his family.






