A Notable Convention.

In session in Winnipeg this week, a Convention of Western Liberals is being held which has a national far more than a party significance. Intense enthusiasm prevails and very important results are looked for. All are meeting in a "Win the War" mood, but all are not agreed upon the steps to be taken in Canada at this juncture. A very large number of the delegates, taking second place to none in war enthusiasm, will pin their faith to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who declared anew a few days ago that he was "in the war to the end," for the overthrow of militarism. Others want to break with him on his referendum attitude, but nearly all are dissatisfied -- not to use a stronger word -- with the incapacity that has marked the present administration.

The re-appearance of Sir Clifford Sifton in the public eye at this juncture has undoubtedly thrown many Liberals into the Laurier camp. They remember his bogus cant and campaign in 1911, long since discredited and they fear that his appearance now is for a political purpose and another flag waving campaign.

The Convention may discover a new leader on whom all sections of the party may unite but in any case, the Convention will prove that the West, with a big big W, is going to exercise a dominating influence in the affairs of the Dominion.

A Pledge Wanted

The following letter shows one of the activities of the New Food Controller:

To the Editor:
The Executive Committee of the Women's Auxiliary to the Organization of Resources Committee, after consultation with the Hon. W. J. Hanna, the Dominion Food Controller, is authorized to state that the Food Controller has adopted the idea of a pledge to be taken in a house to house canvass from each individual housewife to do her best to prevent food waste and to encourage thrift and economy in the home. Where pledges are given the Food Controller will provide a card to be placed in windows, showing that the house is pledged to save food for the Canadian soldiers and our Allies.

The Executive of the Auxiliary has also been assured by the latter's Branch of the Department of Agriculture that they will send a demonstrator in canning to any centre upon application.

The foregoing information is being conveyed to the delegates who last week attended the Women's Convention.
