It grows in rather bushy form has very few leaves but bears an abundance of pods, which contain anywhere from 10 to 20 seeds each. It was evidently given the name on account of its offensive smell. Cattle sometimes eat it and whenever they do and it happens to be a milch cow the milk for days is not fit for use, neither is the cream fit for buttermaking. DRAFT TRIBUNALS

The places at which tribunals will sit in Ontario to hear applications for exemption from military service have been selected by the Government. In most instances one tribunal will be established at each point. In cities, however, provision has been made for several such boards. In Toronto and its suburbs, for instance 30 tribunals will sit, in Hamilton 13, London has 7, Owen Sound 2, Guelph 2, Kitchener 2 and Ottawa 12. In North Bruce, the tribunals will sit at Kincardine, Port Elgin, Wiarton, Lion's Head. In South Bruce, Walkerton, Paisley, Lucknow and Tara.

In Grey County, tribunals will sit at Markdale, Dundalk, Thornbury, Owen Sound (2), Durham, Feversham, Aytton, Meaford, Chatsworth, Hanover, Shallow Lake, Rocklyn.

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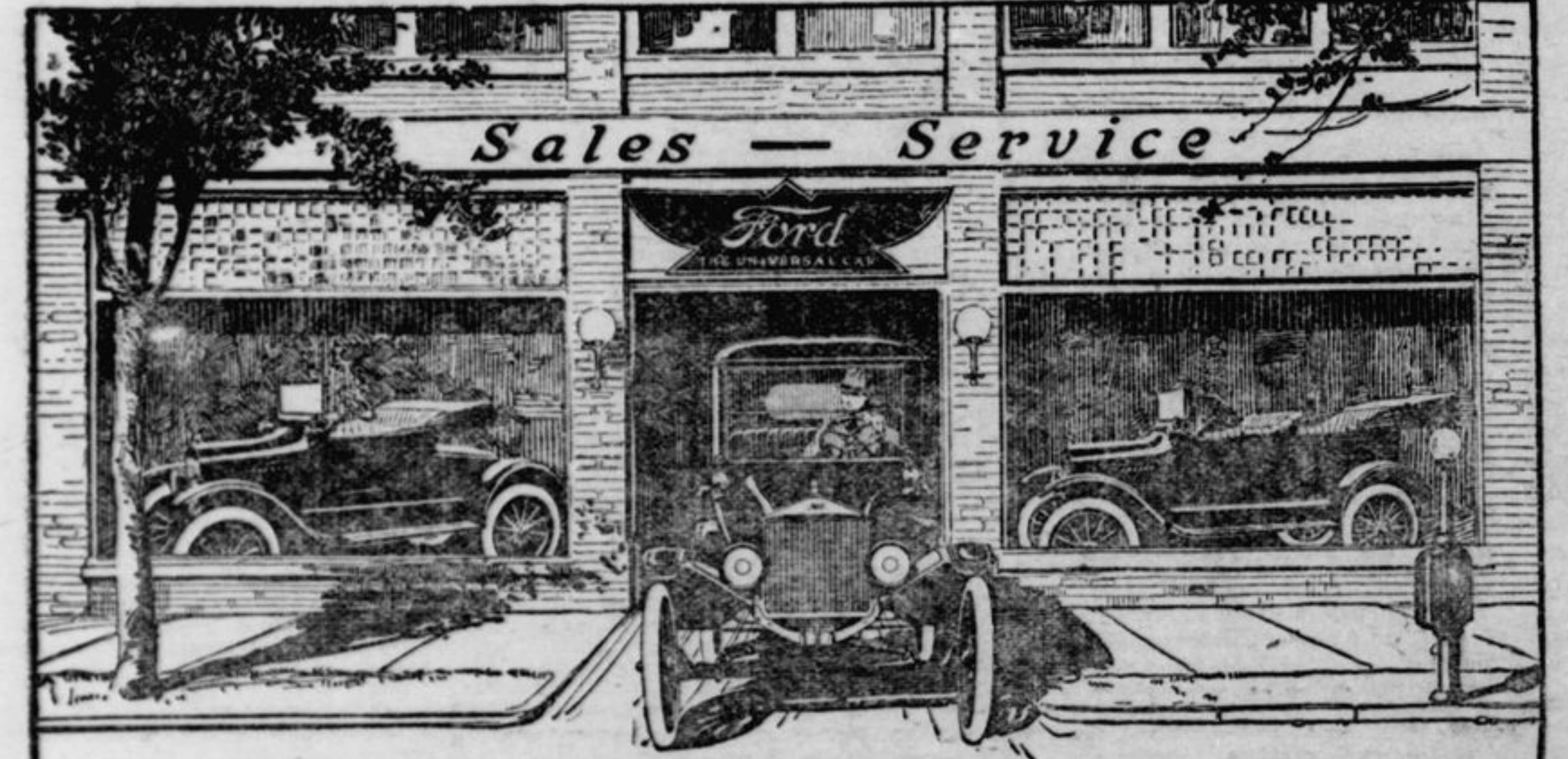
