Council met Sept 8th pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read from S. J. Parker, land sale; R. A. McFadden and 11 others for bonus for wire fence; Thos Turnbull re school equalization; Alex Morrison same; J. A. McDonald explanation re union S S No 2 B. & G; sheep claims R. W. Brady and Mike Barry and several communications from money lenders and good road people.

Black—Peart—That George Binnie be and is hereby appointed Assessor for the Township of Glenelg to make the assessment for the year 1918 according to section 59 of the Assessment Act and that the salary be \$100 for all the duties of an Assessor excepting the selecting of jurors the attending of the Court and the equalizing of union school sections when necessary. Carried.
