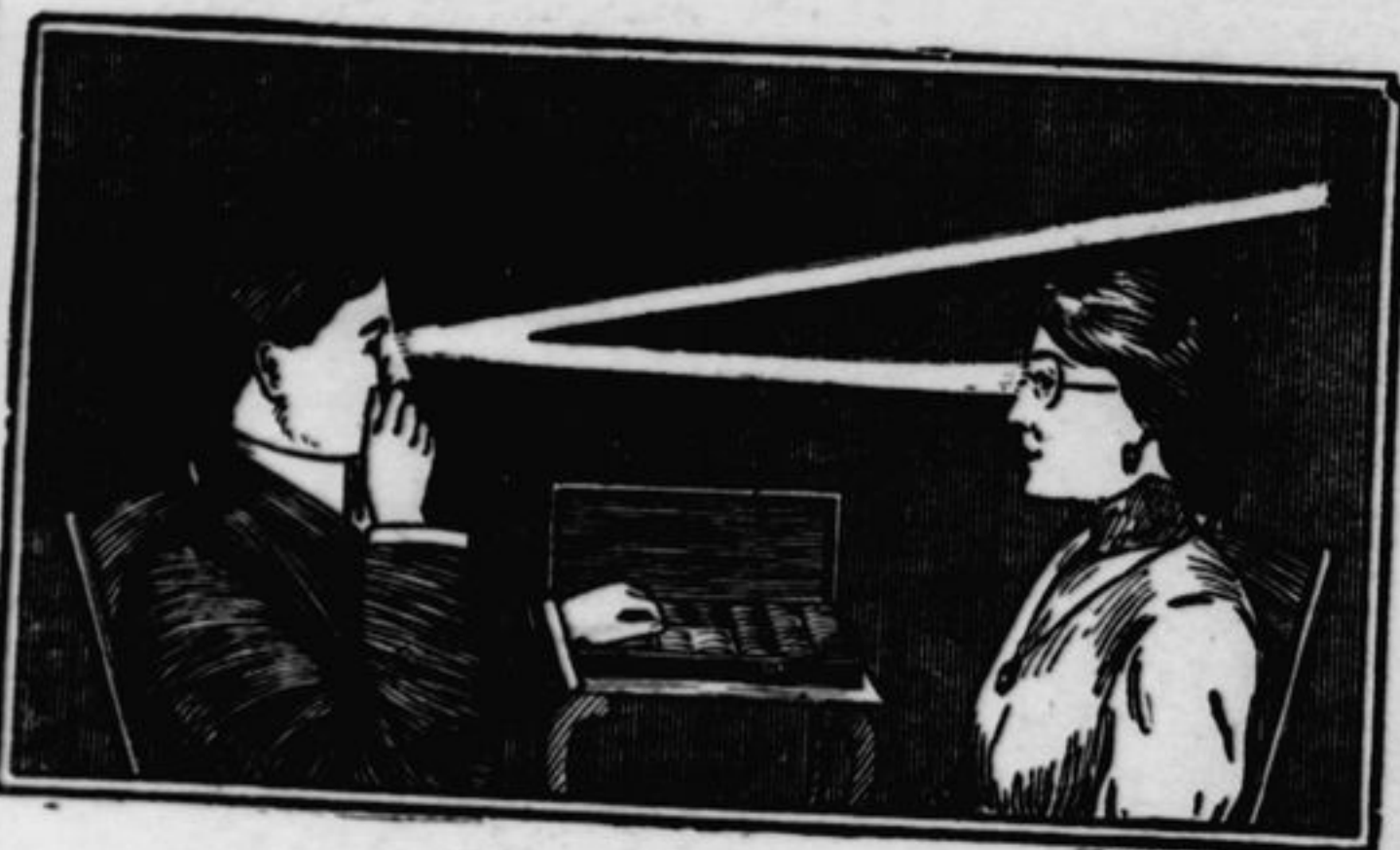

### MULOCK

The Anniversary Services of the Baptist Church held on Sunday and Monday, were a great success. Rev. McEwen, the noted Winton preacher was the speaker of the day. In spite of the weather, the church was well filled and earnest attention was given to the inspiring words and emotional character of Rev. McEwen. He expressed his deep feeling in again coming to Bentinck after an absence of 20 years. Looking into the faces again, he saw a few he had known; others were merely strangers to him.

The morning theme was the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ: M. Mt. 28. He dealt with the character of our Lord from birth to death, drawing a vivid picture of the steps of Christ in youth as firmly faithful, He brought out the humanness of Christ before death, his want of help in time of need. He was deserted even by His beloved John and we try to all alone He had to die the death. Christ was wounded in three ways: 1. In body by His wounds. 2. In reputation being called a blasphemer and a traitor. 3. In soul by Peter failing to watch. His vengeful demon was in Isaiah 63: 1, and again the brilliancy of his intellect was displayed. He closed by comparing the way of salvation to a marriage ceremony. Each has three interested persons in the way of salvation the clergyman was compared to God, the bridegroom was Jesus Christ and the sinner was the bride.

On Monday evening we had another great feast. Rev. Ashton occupied the chair and he and Rev. Falkingham gave short addresses. Rev. McEwen spoke on Home Missions, congratulating the Bentinck people on their work. The principal speaker of the evening was Dr. Smith, for 24 years a devoted servant of the Lord in India gave an interesting and instructive lecture on the customs and religious beliefs of the people, showing their misery and suffering in sickness and the relief afforded by medical evangelistic work.

Bentinck Red Cross workers met in Mulock schoolhouse, Saturday 3 p.m. 29th to ship supplies made by the various branches of the Township. 203 pair of socks, 12 vermin suits, 6 flannel shirts, 42 denim shirts and 48 candles were sent as field comforts: 18 sheets, 6 flannel shirts, 18 pillow slips, 36 towels, 53 suits of pyjamas, were sent as hospital supplies. The value of the goods was estimated at \$386.80.

Word has been received from all our soldier boys who were sent boxes from this branch, wishing to thank our Red Cross workers for the same.
