A GALLANT BRITISH VETERAN.

Fought as a Volunteer Under Garibaldi For the Freedom of Italy. An Englishman living at Exeter,

now seventy-four years of age, who at the age of seventeen fought as a volunteer under Garibaldi in Southern Italy and Sicily, is gallantly doing his "bit" to free England from the German submarine menace, as he fought to free Italy many years ago from the yoke of Austria. On his allotment in Exeter he is growing a belt of wheat, which he sowed last October. Since his Italian campaign he has served over twenty years as a Devon Volunteer, and has a son and two grandsons serving at the present moment in France.

He is proud of the fact that in 1911 he was present at the jubilee of Italian independence, held in Rome, with seven other British survivors of the 1860 campaign. He carried the British colors during the inauguration of the splendid monument erected in hon-or of Victor Emmanuel, the grandfather of the present King of Italy, and he retains a vivid recollection of the conversation he had with the king, who received the British volunteers in audience at the palace.
