The war, its sacrifices and sorrows, were brought home forcibly to the people of this vicinity when it was learned that John Morrison Ledingham had been killed in action on Oct. 26th. The deceased who enlisted in the 147th Batt. in May, 1916, a young man of more than ordinary intelligence and executive ability, had taken a three years' course in Durham High School, attended the Model School in Hanover in the 1914 term and commenced teaching in Moggie school, 2nd con, Holland, in Sept. 1915, where and as a citizen enjoyed the respect and confidence of all.

Being an active and consistent member of Latona Presbyterian Church a memorial service in honor of this, the first of our boys, to make the "great sacrifice" p. m. in that church. In this connection Christmas remembrances to the other members of his family, he had sent his usual contributions to the various departments of the church work early in October.

The heartfelt sympathy of the whole community goes out to the bereaved parents and family, and especially to the eldest brother George A. who, now left alone and sorrowing somewhere in France.

More South Grey Casualties

Last week's list of local casualties did not cover all, suffered in the recent Canadian drive which began on Oct. 26th. Word came last week that Pte. Chas. Chislett of Ceylon had been wounded in the leg. Before enlisting Charlie spent several years in Durham, being employed by John Whittaker.

Priceville vicinity has again been hard hit, Pte Thos Mather, one of the finest young men of that neighborhood being killed in action. Ptes N. J. McMillan, Scotchtown and J. J. Pattison, Ceylon, formerly merchant in Priceville are both wounded.

Holstein and district mourns the death of Corp. Wes. Manary, a well known and popular young man who e listed since the Greys were organized. Pte Roy Eccles, Egremont, wounded once before, is now severely wounded.

The deepest sympathy is also extended to Mr Wm. Davis, of the 2nd con., Egremont, whose son Pte Cecil was killed in action on October 26th, and the same day as only other son John was wounded. In letters home John speaks lightly of his wounds and it is hoped they prove so. Cecil was about 20 years of age, and both brothers enlisted together in the 147th Grey battalion nearly two years ago. The deceased soldier was highly esteemed, and a member of St Paul's Church, Egremont. He is a nephew of Mr Wm. Weir, Glenelg.

Master Walter Miles was knocked down by an auto, near Lambton and main st corner last week, and suffered a cut in the head, which required six stitches to close.

The Nominations

Ball and Wright in the Field

Intense interest was manifested in the nominations on Monday last, the Town Hall proving too small to hold the crowd. Returning Officer Scott at the close of the nomination hour read the writ of His Majesty calling Parliament on 28th February next and announcing that W. H. Wright, barrister and Robt. James Ball, manufacturer were the only nominees. At his request a new chair man was appointed, Mr W. Ferguson, an eastern man receiving the honor.

After conferring with the nominees, an agreement was reached that Mr Ball would speak half an hour. Wright the same and Ball 10 minutes for reply an arrangement carried out without frills and the audience got away in good time.

Mr Ball had compliments for the ladies, pleased to have some of them with us, and this and other things reminding us that issues and conditions had greatly changed since 1911. He had pertinent remarks on the position and aims of Canada in the war which had led to the formation of a union government.

He read selections from Sir Wilfrid Laurier's speech in August 1914, intended to show that his attitude of acquiescence to necessary war measures, they had changed now, and it was up to us to judge how the government and opposition had conducted themselves since that day.

He reviewed the legislation of the Borden government, its assistance to Agriculture and to roadways, the establishment of parcel post and rural routes, &c., and took up the much disputed naval policies of the parties, claiming that the Borden government were in line with the Admiralty's desire to have three Dreadnoughts rather than the alternative Laurier plan of cruisers. He accused Sir Wilfrid of manipulating the Senate and defeat of the bill. Britain's navy has been and is still strong, but we don't know for how long.

Mr Ball had praise for the activity of Sir Sam Hughes in mobilizing 33000 in a text. When Sir Robt. Borden returned from the front he had seen and understood what was needed, he decided on the selective draft process of the Military Service Act rather than fall back on

Grey Co. Strong for Victory Loan

Through energetic campaign work it is confidently expected the amount set to be subscribed in Grey for the Victory Loan \$1,500,000, will be easily reached this month, and very probably exceeded by a substantial sum. Up to Monday night \$861,000 was already subscribed. The Chairman of Grey Co. Committee, J. M. Kibbourn, Owen Sound has promised to subscribe the last \$100,000 when the \$1,400,000 mark is reached.

Durham town, Mr A. H. Jackson, the district chairman informs us, has already subscribed about \$75,000 and the estimate for the district \$175,000, will likely be far surpassed. Durham district, which comprises the town, parts of Glenelg, Ben-tinck and Normanby and all of Egremont is third in the County in amt. now subscribed, exceeded only by Owen Sound and Thornbury.
