Grey Co. Now Aiming at Two Millions

The Executive for Grey County aimed to raise a million and a half in the Victory loan campaign. Mr. J. M. Kilborn promised if it reached \$1,400,000 he would take another \$100,000 worth of bonds. The amount was exceeded and Mr. Kilborn comes down. The Executive now is trying to make it two million and likely to succeed.
Durham district, thoroughly organized by Mr. A. H. Jackson, will lead by a good margin, all the eight Grey districts, except Owen Sound. Durham alone gives \$125,000 and still going—the whole district will exceed \$200,000. Thornbury-Clarksburg comes next to Durham followed by Meaford which is only \$2000 above Markdale at the report. Hanover is the lowest of the eight with \$31,450.
Durham Enumerators are Messrs W. J. Young, Peter Paterson, Christopher Firth. Their duties are to cut off from the 1916 Voters' List all aliens or disqualified persons and to make a list of women relatives of soldiers who have gone overseas, whether now living or dead. This will be posted up in the Post Office next week.

Memorial Services for Wm Cecil Davis

Memorial Services were held in Trinity Church on Sunday morning last to honor the memory and sacrifice of Pte William Cecil Davis, son of Wm Davis, Egremont who fell in the recent advance in France.
Rev. Mr. Dymond had an appropriate message and a large and sympathetic congregation mourned with the mourners.
The choir sang "The Lord is my Shepherd" and hymns suitable were chosen such as "O God our Help in Ages Past," "I know that my Redeemer lives," "No night in Heaven, &c." The text was from the mystic vision of Rev. 6: 2 and the topic was a justification of Wm under certain conditions. Purity was represented by the "White" horse which he took to stand for the righteous army while "he that sat on him" was the white king or advocate of a righteous cause.
St. Paul's church, Egremont, waived their services for the day and joined with Durham to honor their heroic dead. Rev. Mr. Dymond made tender personal references to the boy and saw and spoke comforting words to the bereaved ones.

In Flanders Fields

Two men were arguing. One claimed he had heard the most stirring appeal for Victory War Loan. The other said he had heard a better—in Sherbrooke, P. Q. A third man, taking his cigar from his mouth said: "No, the best appeal for Victory Bonds doesn't once mention their name. Listen" and he read from a clipping the poem by John McRae, of Montreal:
In Flanders fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,
That mark our place, and in the sky
The larks, still bravely singing, fly,
Scarce heard amid the guns below.
We are the dead; short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders fields.
Take up our quarrel with the foe!
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high!
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.

Notes of our Soldier Boys

Pte. Bert Willis, who is still in England has been accidentally wounded. We have not learned as to how the mishap occurred.
A disconcerting telegram from Ottawa brought the news to the editor that his son, Pte. C. C. Ramage had been "wounded slightly, general commotion, but remaining on duty." We hope fuller and better news will follow.
Pte. A. M. A. Mort, Ayton, appears among the deaths in Tuesday's casualty lists.
Pte. Mort was well known in Durham.
Ptes. Harold Vollett and Wm. Darby are both being invalided home, and we hear are already in Canada. The former has an incapacitated hand, and the latter is not physically fit.
Monday's "killed in action" list contained the name of Harold Mitchell, son of the Fiesherston banker. Priceville and Wesherton districts have borne heavy losses of late: Pte. A. A. McKinnon of Ceylon also making the supreme sacrifice on Nov. 6th. An obituary appears in Priceville news.
The following from the Calgary Herald of Nov. 13, refers to the death of Sergt. Harold Skene, youngest son of the late Alex Skene of Regina, formerly of Deronoch, and a nephew of Mrs. James Renton of Egremont. "Srgt. Harold Skene is another Calgary man to have fallen on the battlefields of France. He was before rallying to his country's call a law student with the firm of Peacock, Skene and Skene, and joined up with a local section of a University battalion over two years ago. He was a fine young fellow. He had taken part in much of the fighting on the western front, both on the Somme and at Vimy, and although he had had marvellous escapes he never was actually wounded. On one occasion he fell into a shell hole which was filled with dead and wounded Germans. How he got out alive was one of the singular instances of the charmed life he bore until a Hun bullet at last laid him low. He enlisted as a private and was promoted to the rank of sergeant. A short time ago he was recommended for a commission. At the time of his death he was in charge of the machine gun section of his battalion, which was one of the first to leave the west for overseas. Lieut. Stanley Donald Skene who is in France, and who was engaged in the same drive in which his brother was killed, cabled that he was well but that Harold had been killed.

Road By-Law Passed

The only important business at Session of Co. Council on Saturday was, says the Owen Sound Advertiser, the Good Roads Legislation. A by-law was passed designating the roads that have to be built. The most important of these are from Owen Sound to Mt. Forest, Owen Sound to Warton, Owen Sound to Collingwood and Owen Sound to Dundalk. In addition to these roads a trunk line running east and west through the lower part of the county will connect up with the Simcoe and Bruce County Line, running through the towns of Priceville, Fiesherston and Durham. A resolution was passed requesting the government to take over these roads as provincial highways, especially the long roads running Warton via Kemble, Owen Sound, Meaford and Thornbury to Collingwood and the cross country roads at the south connecting the three counties. In addition to these roads other township concessions were also named.
No Inspector under the system was appointed, this matter being left over for consideration at the January session. Other business dealt with was of a routine character.

In a letter recently received from his mother, Mr. John Turnbull, of Vancouver she states it was the Military medal, not the D. C. M., which their son Alex won, short time ago. He was awarded it for saving his Scout Officer's life while on a daylight patrol. They came upon a sleeping German sentry, who awoke and turned on the officer. Alex killed the German and saved the officer, but scarcely mentioned the deed, as his chum supplied the above particulars to the home folks. Alex has since been made Lce-Corporal, then Corporal and when last heard was sergeant stationed at the Battalion Headquarters. At the Canadian Sports this fall he also won a silver cup as first prize in the half-mile race.
