At the Presbytery of Sauguen at Mt. Forest on the 4th inst., Rev. Wm. Cooper, convener of the committee on the duties of the church in relation to "After the War Problems," submitted following recommendations...

In regards to the return of the soldiers it was recommended:

- 1. That each congregation appoint a Committee (1) To meet and receive returned soldiers and to arrange for a Congregational welcome. (2) To arrange that letters, papers and magazines be sent to the soldiers overseas...

"A few lines while on a short rest from duty "up the line." I understand we return to the game shortly. You will have read how the Canadians "went over the top" successfully at Passchendaele and took the ridge. The infantry boys did fine work, though many were too speedy, and (nine words here censored)...

Many of the boys who came overseas with me and at Orpington, are now in France in the 3rd Field Ambulance. As the ambulances work in conjunction during a scrap I had the pleasure of meeting many of them. Two of them were wounded seriously and will be sent to England...
