The Annual Report of the M. O. Health was read as follows:

To the Chairman and Members of the Egremont Board of Health, Gentlemen;

As Medical Officer of Egremont Township I beg to report as follows for the year 1917. The Township has been fairly free from disease during the whole year and there has been no severe epidemic of any kind with regard to the contagious diseases.

Six cases of scarlet fever were reported with no deaths. There were five cases of diphtheria reported confined to two families, no deaths. There were a number of cases of measles during January and February, some quite severe and followed by pneumonia, no deaths. A case of typhoid has been reported during the year. Notes from Farm Bulletins

All investigations go to show that farm manure has a greatest value when fresh, that the liquid portion is richer than the solid material and that the former is more readily lost through drainage and leaching. Hence it is that every precaution is taken at the Experimental Farms, to make a minimum loss of plant food constituents in the manure and is the chief reason for applying manure to land, where practicable as quickly as possible after it is produced.

At the Central Farm, Ottawa, liquid manure is absorbed by means of litter usually cut straw, and as each load of mixed liquid and solid manure is gathered it is taken directly to a field and is spread on land either by hand or by a manure spreader, as conveniently throughout the year, although during occasional winter seasons this system may be disorganized for a time due to depth of snow or other causes.

Where manure is applied for cultivated or hoed crops the importance of incorporating the manure thoroughly with the soil as near to surfaces as practicable, is closely observed.

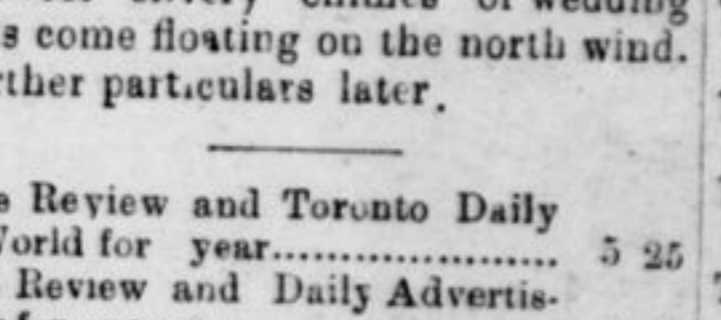
