Still Harping on Inconsistency

Last week's Chronicle claims that the Review accepting Union Govt advertising and refusing liquor ads, was not the issue under criticism. We were inconsistent because we supported a Laurier candidate and advertised for the opposite party. The first he states was a "trumped up charge," which is false, as it was brought up in the editorial in question. The Review does no side stepping. Now that the Chronicle plainly states its real grievance, we can again ask "Where the inconsistency?" The Review was not a supporter of the Laurier platform in its entirety, as our confere infers, and neither was the candidate we supported. The Review has always believed in the Military Service Act, and Mr Wright was an independent candidate pledged to its support and to all vigorous war measures. In its editorial utterances, the Review never did or will ride two horses; we will not open our advertising columns to anything tending to a lower moral standard or otherwise objectionable; but in great public issues where differences of opinion may rightly exist, our advertising columns are open to either side. Both parties purchased our space, we openly announced on the front page they had done so and to prevent any possible misunderstanding, under any possible misadvertisements published, we inserted the word "adv't."

Apparently the Chronicle believes in giving its readers no opportunity to form their own independent judgment, as far as lies in its power; it would shut off all light except on the side it favored. The Review has in some past elections carried Conservative advertising; strange there was then no wail regarding our inconsistency.

A similar situation was seen in the recent municipal election in Toronto. The Globe and Star strongly supported Cameron for Mayor editorially, but carried advertising for Church, his opponent. What glaring inconsistency! We move that our self-appointed, all-wise critic at once write or wire these journals, sternly reprimanding them for thus being guilty and misleading the public!!!

In their addresses on election night, Dr Jamieson and Reeve Calder both advised no undue exultation and to celebrate calmly; on the contrary, judging by his paper the next week, our confere thought it a glorious opportunity to "rub it in." He is welcome to the satisfaction thus derived.

War Notes

Lloyd George has made a great speech setting forth the war aims of the Allies in a fashion never before done. It has won praise from all sections of the press, the Allies are pleased with it, and its influence on German thought must be great.

There is one notable back down: Turkey is to have Constantinople, but the Dardanelles and Bosphorus are to be open to all nations. At one time the Turk was to be swept out of Europe.

Firm as ever Britain will back France in demanding return of Alsace and Lorraine. Also Belgium must be restored and reparations made same with Serbia, Montenegro and Roumania.

The captured German colonies are to be placed under governments chosen by the people of the colonies.

Armenia, Palestine, Arabia, Mesopotamia, are to have independence apart from Turkey.

The speech also denies intention of the Allies to dismember Germany but makes it plain that no settlement can be made with present rulers.

Indications point to a revolution in Germany perhaps as marked as Russia, and should there be, peace would be in sight.

The peace conferences between Russia and Germany are coming to nought, but the Russian army is almost useless as a fighting power.

The feeding of Britain and the Allies is the great pressing problem, and to this end ships and more ships are needed, to carry men and supplies.

About one third of the men called up on the first draft, have ignored the call and therefore are deserters. There will be some lively times rounding them up and the authorities will have to get busy.

Following a session Premier Lloyd George's great speech comes another and greater presentation of Allied War Aims from Pres Wilson. These are set out in 14 headings and furnish a notable endorsement and encouragement to the British and encouraging to see the two great branches of the English speaking families of one mind in this war.

—W. K. Proudfoot, M. P. P., was chosen as leader of the Provincial Liberal party at a gathering of his fellow members last week. The selection of course is provincial, and a permanent selection will be made by a Convention later on. Mr C. Bowman, M. P. P., was offered the position but declined.

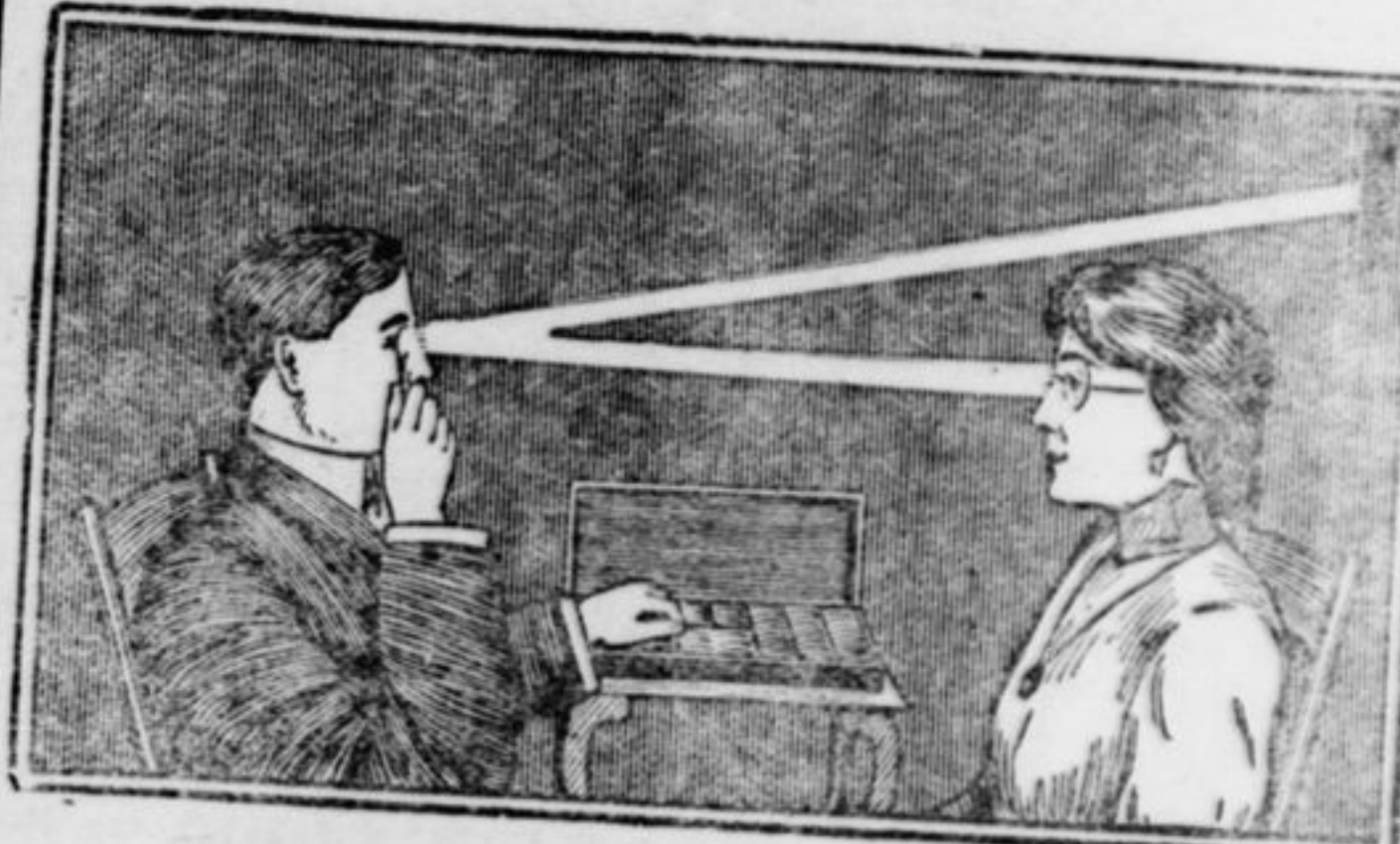
