The following letter of appreciation from D. B. McLeod, son of the former Priceville boy, was received by Miss Laura...

France, Dec 27, 1917 I received your parcel in the best condition and greeted it with a perfectly good appetite...

But the list of friends enclosed is so long and the writer so modest that I cannot figure out who is responsible for any one of the articles...

We have a fairly good camp here and we live a more peaceful and contented life at the front than in the training camps...

Our division has been out on rest since we came from Ypres and a person sure needs a little rest after paddling over the mud flats from Ypres to Paschendaele...

I would like very much to hear from Priceville. Since coming to France the

only Priceville boy I have seen is Dave McLeod and I met him through some Calgary friends. I saw him a few weeks ago looking fine and doing well...

I have heard of the loss your family has suffered. I only knew your brothers as very little boys. But from my memories of your father and mother, I know that when real work is to be done or danger met...

I will write soon to some of the other members of the Red Cross Society to say thanks. It feels good to be remembered after so long.
