

# Take out a Driver's Certificate

The Ontario Dept. of Highways now issues what is known as a Non-Professional Driver's Certificate of competency. It is issued to persons who wish to pass the same examination prescribed for paid drivers, and is recommended by the Dept. to all motor-car owners and drivers as a desirable Certificate to possess. In case of accident, it would serve as evidence of a driver's competency to operate a car.

**H. P. McIntyre, of the Chevrolet Garage, has been appointed Chauffeur Examiner for this district for 1918.** The fee for examination is only \$1.00, and the Department charges \$1 for the certificate. This is permanent and does not require to be renewed from year to year.

There is no other Dept. Examiner in this locality. Protect yourself when driving your car by owning this Certificate. There is only the small initial expense to it. No person under 16 years old is allowed to drive a car and no one under 18, unless they possess this Certificate.

## County Road Inspector

John Johnston of Keppel secures the office at \$1500

Grey County has now a thorough road organization for the purpose of maintaining the some 400 miles of country roads designated in the by-law passed last year. Last week at the Friday session of the County Council Mr John Johnston of Keppel, farmer, was appointed County Inspector of Roads at a salary of \$1500 per annum and ordinary expenses. Mr. Johnston obtained the appointment by quite a majority over Mr John Leask of Derby who ran second for the place.

Mr Johnston brings to the position considerable valuable experience and personal qualifications that should go far toward making his administration of this department highly successful. For seventeen years he has been a member of the County Council and for an equal length of time has been active in the municipal administration of the Township of Keppel. In that township he has had peculiar opportunities to become acquainted with road construction methods, Keppel having had a colonization road running through it for a number of years. From his experience in the connection Mr Johnston is not entirely a beginner in the matter of supervision of roads under the Highways Dept. of the Provincial government.

To assist Mr. Johnston and to act with him on behalf of the County Council generally, a special committee was appointed by that body last Saturday morning. This committee is composed of Warden Boyd of Markdale, John McQuaker, Owen Sound, Mr Hookridge, Proton and Mr. Mc Coleman, Collingwood. The Committee will meet regularly at stated intervals necessary for the work of the newly created department.

By way of explanation it might be noted that the Inspector or Supervisor's duties are as arduous in winter as in summer. In summer of course he looks after the repair of all county roads that have been designated and the construction of new roads where decided upon within this system; and in winter it is also his duty to keep those roads open for traffic. It is understood that the cost of snowploughing on these roads in the winter will be partially borne by the government in the same proportion as summer maintenance will be borne by it.—Advertiser.
